- 1. Committee established. The Joint Study Committee to Examine Issues Relating to the North American Free Trade Agreement, referred to in this order as the "committee," is established.
- 2. Membership. The committee consists of all members of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry.

- 3. Chairs. The chairs of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry are the chairs of the committee.
- 4. Convening committee. The chairs of the committee shall call and convene the first meeting of the committee no later than 30 days following the passage of this order.
- 5. Duties. The committee shall hold hearings in the areas of this State most affected by the North American Free Trade Agreement and shall examine issues relating to the North American Free Trade Agreement, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - A. Agriculture, agricultural products and activities relating to agriculture;
 - B. Forestry, forestry products and activities relating to forestry;
 - C. Fisheries dumping, which depresses prices in this State;
 - D. The impact of a lack of uniform standards for chemical use and disease control on imported agriculture products;
 - E. Trees cut in this State by Canadian labor and exported to Canada, then resold in the United States as finished products;
 - F. The advantage for Canadian trade due to government subsidies in health care and family subsidies for Canadian workers:
 - G. The use of a quota that bars United States exports of agricultural products into Canada; and
 - H. Any other issues developed from the hearing process.

The committee shall gather data relating to the impact of the value of the Canadian dollar on border shopping.

- 6. Staff assistance. Upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the committee.
- 7. Compensation. Members of the committee are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses for attendance at meetings of the committee.
- 8. Report. The committee shall report on the issues studied with any recommendations to the Congressional Delegation of this State and the Legislature prior to the reauthorization of the North American Free Trade Agreement in September 2001.
- 9. Committee budget. The chairs of the committee, with assistance from the committee staff, shall administer the committee's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the committee shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. The committee may not incur expenses that would result in the committee's exceeding its

approved budget. Upon request from the committee, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council or the executive director's designee shall provide the committee chairs and staff with a status report on the committee's budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Franklin, Senator Woodcock.

Senator **WOODCOCK**: Thank you, Madame President. Good morning to the men and women of the Senate. I rise today to urge you to vote against the majority Ought to Pass motion. The world in which we live is a very contradictory world and such is the nation of retail liquor sales in the state. How is it that we wholesale liquor? How is it that we retail liquor? How is it that we grant a retail license to sell liquor and then compete against the licensee? This bill, in my opinion, is an intrusion into the world the of retail licensee. It is a contradictory world. How is it that my nose smells, my feet run? How is it that my nose runs, my feet smell? I urge against this motion. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Douglass.

Senator DOUGLASS: Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I wish to speak in favor of the majority Ought to Pass report. This bill is about whether we are going to encourage a loss leader in our large retail stores and to allow that that loss leader be liquor. In the last summer season several large retailers were able to purchase 30 packs of beer for the price of \$14.99. That's the wholesale price. Then they sold them to the public at the price of \$9.99, having a \$5 loss. Our small Ma and Pa stores are not able to do that. This bill is about your philosophy. If your philosophy is that we should not be encouraging people to go to a store just to get a 30-pack of beer, than you are going to be in favor of the majority Ought to Pass report. There is another issue at stake here, which is not only your philosophy with regards to alcohol, but your philosophy with regards to competition generally. because this is truly one of those bills that pits our smaller stores against our larger stores. If you're in favor of continuing to support the small retailers we have in the state then you will vote in favor of the majority Ought to Pass report. I hope that you will do so today.

The Chair ordered a Division. 14 Senators having voted in the affirmative and 18 Senators having voted in the negative, the motion by Senator **DAGGETT** of Kennebec to **ACCEPT** the Majority **OUGHT TO PASS** Report, **FAILED**.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Mitchell.

Senator MITCHELL: Thank you, Madame President. Good morning fellow Senators. I rise this morning to ask you to join me in celebration of the great life of Lewis V. Vafiades. Lou was a friend, mentor, counselor, and loved by all for ever giving of himself to others. His caring kindness will always be recognized for the good that he recognized in people. A well respected attorney, renowned for his ability in the courtroom, not only in the City of Bangor where his law firm is located but throughout the state, across the country and internationally. His love for the sea brought many happy hours to him and his beloved wife, Marion. I recall many happy memories of Sunday afternoons with Lou and Marion and Senator Sawyer on his boat, cruising the coast of Maine. Behind every great man, they always say, there is a great woman and Lou was no exception because with us this morning we have his beloved wife, Marion, his grandson, Chris, and his sister. Athena, who is the wife of former Senator John Cox. They are here too to join us in the celebration of this great man. Behind many of our Maine leaders was Lou Vafiades. Providing the strength, support, a guiding hand and a mentor to Honorable Bill Cowen, U.S. Senator Olympia Snowe, U.S. Senator Susan Collins, and many of us on a state level who are sitting here in this room this morning. I wouldn't be here today without the mentoring and the dear friendship of the beloved Lewis Vafiades. He visited this chamber most recently in December and enjoyed and admired the legislators in this Senate. He was here in December when we had our swearing in ceremony and he and Marion sat behind me here in the Chamber and enjoyed the day of our swearing in ceremony and the breakfast that morning with many of us. Lou, yes, you will be missed but will always be remembered for your smile and warm hand of friendship and confidence that you placed in people. A parable of immortality by Henry Van Dyke. "In a beautiful blue lagoon, on a clear day, a fine sailing ship spreads its brilliant white canvas in a fresh morning breeze and sails out to the open seas. She is an object of beauty and strength and I stand and watch until at last she grows smaller and smaller as she nears the horizon. Finally, where the sea and sky meet, she slips silently from sight.

Someone near me says there, she is gone. Gone where? Gone from sight. That is all. She is still just as large in mast and hull and sail as she was when she left my side. She is just as able to bear her load of delivering freight to the place of destination. Her diminished size is in me, not in her. We can be sure that as we say there, she has gone, there are other eyes watching her coming and other voices ready to take up the glad shout of here she comes."

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Youngblood.

Senator **YOUNGBLOOD**: Thank you, Madame President. I would like to echo the sentiments of Senator Mitchell. We all have a responsibility to leave this world a better place than we found it. Lewis Vafiades certainly falls into that category. It's wonderful to see his lovely wife, Marion, here with us this morning. I had the pleasure of serving on a variety of committees with Lewis Vafiades, on boards with his wonderful wife, Marion. He will be greatly missed not only in the city of Bangor, not only in the eastern Maine region, not only in the State of Maine, but he was a contributor throughout the United States. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Longley.

Senator LONGLEY: Thank you, Madame President. I'd like to stand and speak of how Mr. Lou Vafiades looked to those of us who may not have been Republicans but were new lawyers in the Bangor area. I was clerking at the time and whenever I think of Mr. Lou Vafiades I think of a really good teacher. It was real obvious to him that he loved the law. It was very obvious to him, too, that the new lawyers needed to go under someone's wing to learn how to fly. In my looking over the landscape of all the lawyers in the Bangor community, it was real obvious to me that if I were going to go into a firm, the firm I'd like to go into was the one with Mr. Lou Vafiades because he was such a caring, kind and talented teacher. I can't think of a finer compliment to give anyone in his life than to say they had been a good teacher. So thank you, via his wife, for all that he was able to display and share with the members of the legal community and all of Maine. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Sawyer.

Senator **SAWYER**: Thank you, Madame President. I, too would like to rise in recognition with honor and sadness the life of Lou Vafiades. Three generations of my family had an opportunity and the distinct pleasure of knowing Lou. My dad played football with Lou. My daughter worked with Lou at the Bangor Y's Fitness Center when the great shout would go up "hey, Louie." For my part, Lou was an enthusiastic mentor and always willing to lend a hand or offer advice, perhaps, most particularly, only when asked for it. I would like to paraphrase Senator Mitchell, however, by suggesting that beside every great man stands a great women. I'd like welcome Marion to the chamber.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills.

Senator MILLS: The scary part for me in standing up to speak about Lou is that I remember him as a young lawyer. When I was a much younger lawyer we had cases together and cases against each other. Lou was one of those lawyers that exemplified what I liked to call the Bangor spirit of practicing law. There's not a lot of paperwork involved, not a lot of procedure or folderol. Lawvers call each other up and exchange information on what they have about their respective cases. They treat each other like gentlemen and gentlewomen. Lou had one of the first law firms in the state of Maine. Lou's was one of the first in the state of Maine to hire a woman trial lawyer way back in 1966. He was an open, candid, joyous person and not the kind of lawyer you'd see on TV with the baseball bat or anywhere else with a baseball bat. He killed you with kindness. He knew that the ultimate arbitrary of his client's cause was the jury to whom he was speaking. He knew that the jury and the judges were watching him and his conduct with the other side. He was gracious almost to a fault. He was a wonderful to try cases with. I had a number of occasions to have law suits with him. The last time I saw him was when he was sitting right here about 2 feet behind me for the swearing. He was devoted, utterly devoted, to politics. Never ran for office, to my knowledge. As I read his obituary I learned how much we really had in common in some ways. He and I were both military cryptographers and I never knew about that and never had the occasion to ask him about it. I'm going to miss him a great deal. The entire bar misses him because he served as such a noble example of how to practice law and how to practice law decently. I can remember going to a speaking engagement at a Maine Bar Association seminar and there was Lou, nearly 80 years old, sitting in front, as a student, taking notes on what I had to say. It was the most flattering thing imaginable. But he was taking notes on everyone else as well. He was still learning in his 70's and realized that life is a process of being a constant learner. Thank vou.
