It also requires the department to pay administrative expenses and interest charged on lines of credit or loans accessed by a service provider when a delay in awarding, finalization or payment of a department contract requires the service provider to access the line of credit or loan. It repeals the provision creating the ombudsman program in the Child and Family Services and Child Protection Act but retains services formerly provided by the ombudsman to be provided by the Office of the Child Advocate. The bill also requires a person or entity to certify whether a request for a public record is a commercial request or a noncommercial request and whether the public information subject to the request is likely to be produced pursuant to an ongoing judicial proceeding and to provide additional information, as necessary, to the agency or official having custody or control of a public record subject to the request. The bill requires the commission to create and maintain a publicly accessible website that displays this information to the public. It also expands the definition of "lobbying" and "grassroots lobbying" to include communicating directly with any official in the executive branch for the purpose of influencing any rulemaking. It requires a lobbyist or lobbyist associate who provides public comment on a proposed agency rule to disclose to the agency the name of the person or organization that lobbyist or lobbyist associate is representing in the same manner as when testifying before a joint select or joint standing committee of the Legislature. The amendment also establishes a task force to address the need for data centralization for tax expenditures, including evaluation of barriers to access to this data and disclosure of Maine tax expenditures and incentives information to the public. tax	1555	An Act to Establish an Employer Tax Credit for Qualifying Child Care Costs	<a href="#">LD1555</a>	Repeals the prior employer-assisted day care tax credit program under MRS 36 5217. The amount of the annual credit is 50% of the amount expended up to a maximum of \$8,000 per child or a total annual credit of \$80,000, whichever is lower. The credit is equal to 30% of the cost of the qualifying working waterfront disaster mitigation project but may not exceed \$300,000. The bill allows an agricultural enterprise determined eligible by the authority to qualify for a tax credit for investments made in infrastructure, not including real estate, but including any improvement that expands the marketing, production or processing of agricultural products, in addition to the qualifying investments that may be made by a business. Liquor, water, medicine, dietary substitutes, candy, dessert and bakery items and cannabis remain subject to tax, regardless of where sold. "Grocery store" is defined to be a store primarily engaged in the retail sale of canned food, dry goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, fresh meats, fish and poultry and includes a convenience store, but does not include a separately owned eating establishment located within a grocery store. bottle	2036	An Act to Clarify the Approval Process for and the Operation of the Commingling Program for the Management of Beverage Containers	<a href="#">LD2036</a>	Amends the laws governing the beverage container redemption program to provide that the operation plan for the management of beverage containers under a single commingling program submitted to DEP by the commingling cooperative must be designed to complete the transition from beverage container sorting by brand to sorting by material type no later than October 1, 2026, as long as at least 90% of the initiators of deposit included in the program have provided auditable beverage container sales data to the commingling cooperative by June 30, 2026. It also provides that the department's review of and determination of whether to approve or reject an operation plan submitted by the commingling cooperative is not a license or permit decision or other final action of the department and is not subject to the rules adopted by the department regarding processing of applications. cannabis	584	An Act to Make the Director of the Office of Cannabis Policy an Appointed Position Subject to Confirmation by the Legislature	<a href="#">LD584</a>	Provides that the Director of the OCP within DAFS is appointed by the Governor and that the appointment is subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over cannabis matters and to confirmation by the Legislature... requires the Governor to appoint the Director ... no later than 60 days after the effective date of this legislation. cannabis	948	An Act to Reduce Administrative Burdens and Expand Access in the Laws Governing Cannabis	<a href="#">LD948</a>	Increases the current limit under the medical cannabis laws to allow a caregiver to cultivate up to 60 mature cannabis plants, up to 120 immature cannabis plants, up to 1,000 square feet of mature plant canopy and up to 2,000 square feet of immature plant canopy. The bill also amends the medical cannabis and adult use cannabis laws to extend registration and license periods from one year to 2 and updates the license renewal process for registrants and licensees without any violations of those laws in the previous year to require only the payment of the license fee or registration fee to DAFS OCP for a new active license to be issued. The bill defines "cannabis hospitality lounge" as a location that is open to members of the public who are 21 years of age or older and is licensed or approved by a municipality or other local government entity within the unorganized and deorganized areas of the State where persons 21 years of age or older may consume adult use cannabis, adult use cannabis products and edible products that do not contain cannabis... cannabis	1609	An Act to Prevent the Participation of Individuals and Companies Linked to Federally Recognized Criminal Organizations in the Medical and Adult Use Cannabis Programs	<a href="#">LD1609</a>	Requires Office of Cannabis Policy to deny a license under the Cannabis Legalization Act to any person associated with organized crime as identified by state or federal law enforcement officers within the 5 years prior to application. It requires the office to deny a license to any person who operates a cannabis establishment at a physical location known to be associated with organized crime within the 5 years before the finding of the association as identified by state or federal law enforcement officers. It also requires the office to revoke, for a period of 5 years, a license currently held by a licensee if the person or the physical location of a licensed cannabis establishment is known to be associated with organized crime as identified by state or federal law enforcement officers. cannabis	1820	An Act to Simplify Regulation of the Adult Use Cannabis Industry	<a href="#">LD1820</a>	Amends the Cannabis Legalization Act and the laws governing personal adult use of cannabis by eliminating the individual identification card requirement for licensees, eliminating cannabis purchase limits, eliminating certain requirements regarding the inspection of licensed premises and eliminating certain cannabis and cannabis product labeling requirements. The bill amends certain provisions regarding cannabis delivery transactions, including allowing licensees to use the tracking system established by DAFS OCP to track delivery transactions and sales at specified events. The bill prohibits the OCP from requiring licensees to sign forms that require the licensees to waive certain rights protected under constitutional, statutory or common law privilege. It provides that an excise tax is not imposed on the sale or transfer of adult use cannabis between cultivation facilities and products manufacturing facilities.
