




Long-Term Care Overview

Aging in Maine


Percent of Population Age 65+ in 2016

Supply and Demand

- 52%-70% of individuals turning 65 today will eventually need some form of long term assistance with their activities of daily living (US DHHS, 2017; Reinhard *et al.*, 2017)
- 1st in percent of nursing home residents with low care needs
- Top 20 on most measures of provider supply: personal care assistants, registered nurse hours per resident assisted living and residential care units
- 6th on value of family caregiving per resident (AARP 2018 Across the States)
- Significant volunteer contributions:
 - 352,790 hours contributed in 2018 through Maine's Senior Volunteer Programs valued at \$8.7 million
 - 78 SHIP volunteer counselors helped Mainers save \$2.9 million in Medicare costs
 - Maine Senior Community Service Employment Program participants have provided 113,425 community service hours to non-profit host agencies



- LTSS service are include but are not limited to: Employment Support, Nursing Services, Respite, Personal Care, Home Making, Community Support, Residential Support, Assistive Technology, Environmental Modifications

Career Ladder / Workforce Development Past DHHS Effort

In 2010, Maine's DHHS was awarded a 3-year grant from the US DHHS Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) to develop a competency-based training and certification program for the three largest job titles in the LTSS system. DHHS partnered with a project team from the University of Southern Maine's Muskie School of Public Service.

The key focus of the initiative was to develop one standardized core curricula and three specialty modules containing the non-overlapping, job-specific content for each certificate. Impacted disciplines were Personal Support Specialists, Mental Health Support Specialists and Direct Support Professionals.

Accomplishments:

- Development and implementation of the core plus training model design for three certificate programs
- Prepared a total of 161 direct service workers
