Supplemental budget recommendations

On January 30, 2023, the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources reviewed the budget items pertaining to the agencies under its jurisdiction in the Governor's proposed supplemental budget for FY23, as considered in LD 206.

As described below, all ENR members present and voting at the January 30th meeting recommend acceptance of the budget proposal pertaining to the Department of Environmental Protection, with an additional note/recommendation.

Department of Environmental Protection

The 12 members¹ present and voting on January 30, 2023 recommend acceptance of the Department of Environmental Protection budget proposal presented on OFPR Worksheet page 1, with the following additional note/recommendation.

At the joint public hearing on January 25, 2023, AFA Committee member Representative Sawin Millett had posed a question to the Commissioner of Environmental Protection regarding carrying authority for the one-time \$10,000 General Fund appropriation proposed in section A-11 (Ref. # 111). From the Commissioner's testimony, we understand that the \$10,000 would be designed to support product sampling by DEP under the Maine Toxics in Food Packaging program for a number of years.

Given this stated intent to use these funds beyond FY 23 and in light of Representative Millett's question at the hearing, our Committee supports amendment of this initiative, as necessary, to ensure that DEP has carrying authority for this appropriation so that any of these funds not spent at the close of FY 23 do not lapse but can be carried forward into future fiscal years for the purposes described in the initiative.
