JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MAINE'S REALTORS

WHEREAS, the Maine Association of REALTORS® has more than 6,500 members actively involved in the business of real estate, with members and affiliates including lenders, appraisers, title companies, building inspectors, surveyors and insurance providers; and

WHEREAS, the not-for-profit trade association provides each member with an equal voice and representation in the real estate profession, serving members in all 16 Maine counties and in their communities; and

WHEREAS, a healthy supply of affordable, safe, secure and high-quality residential and commercial real estate inventory statewide supports the continuing growth of Maine's economy; and

WHEREAS, real estate transactions stimulate Maine's economy and include not only the money spent and reinvested in the sale price of a property but all those services and expenditures that occur in relation to a property transaction, for both a buyer and a seller; and

WHEREAS, according to national statistics, it is estimated that 3 jobs are generated for each home sold, each home sale contributes about \$170,150 to the economy and the real estate industry accounts for 19.5% of the gross state product in 2024; and

WHEREAS, the real estate market in Maine is strong, as evidenced by the number of home sales and the overall impact on Maine's economy in 2024 of 18.3 billion dollars; and

WHEREAS, real estate ownership is an investment in the future and one of the best ways to build financial security through equity accumulation, and for many in Maine their real property ownership represents their life savings; and

WHEREAS, expanding real property ownership will strengthen our State and its families and communities, enhance our economy and create jobs; now, therefore, be it

Bill "An Act to Establish Greater Alignment of Penalties for Certain Labor Law Violations"

(H.P. 1045) (L.D. 1587)

Minority (4) **OUGHT NOT TO PASS** Report of the Committee on **LABOR READ** and **ACCEPTED** in the House on February 24, 2026.

Came from the Senate with the Majority (6) **OUGHT TO PASS AS AMENDED** Report of the Committee on **LABOR READ** and **ACCEPTED** and the Bill **PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED AS AMENDED BY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-808)** in **NON-CONCURRENCE**.

Speaker FECTEAU of Biddeford moved that the House **RECEDE AND CONCUR**.

Representative DRINKWATER of Milford **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **RECEDE AND CONCUR**.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Portland, Representative Beck.

Representative **BECK**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The opposition to this amended bill has been, in my view, overwrought and misguided. This bill gives to the Bureau of Labor Standards the same investigatory tools already in place at other State agencies while protecting all due process rights of employers. It will help protect workers against the scourge of wage theft and also protects small businesses who do the right thing from unfair competition.

The Maine Department of Labor's 2025 annual report on wage and hour complaints and violations was issued just last month. Over the last three years, more than \$1.8 million owed to Maine workers went unpaid. And those are just the unpaid wages we know about. Many more instances of wage theft likely went unreported. The implementation of new enforcement tools and complaint processing improvements in 2025 was a significant step forward in labor law compliance, but challenges remain, particularly in wage recovery and employer accountability. The Department's report says, and I quote, "not all employers voluntarily pay the wages and liquidated damages owed or the penalties assessed. The Wage and Hour Division has limited ways to enforce the findings of wage violations. Legislation is currently pending;" LD 1587; "that would augment the Division's ability to identify and levy against employers' assets when wages are owed to workers and better serve workers harmed by labor violations." Closed quote.

Wage theft is stealing from Maine workers. It's just as bad as reaching into their wallets and pocketing their cash. When their wages are stolen, they can't pay their rent or mortgage, put gas in their car or feed their families. We can do something to fight back against wage theft today. Please support the pending motion to help ensure that Maine workers get paid promptly for the important work that they do. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Madison, Representative Ducharme.

Representative **DUCHARME**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I believe everybody on this side would agree that people who work should get paid. My objection to this particular legislation is that it gives one person the authority to put onto a business in the State of Maine a notice of levy, which is a power that is immense when it comes to people in the banking business. Having worked in the banking business for 20-plus years, when you get a notice of levy, everybody in the building knows it because everybody has to focus on it. So, allowing the Director in the Department of Labor the ability to put on a notice of levy on a business will then allow one person to make a decision to freeze all the assets of any business in the State of Maine based on their own investigation. That's my objection to it. Thank you.

WHEREAS, social workers advocate for the rights of the disadvantaged and oppressed; and

WHEREAS, social workers advocate for children's rights to a safe environment and a good education; and

WHEREAS, social workers advocate for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer rights; and

WHEREAS, social workers advocate for the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin or income with respect to development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, rules and policies; and

Representative **GRAMLICH**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. I rise today to recognize March 2026 as Social Work Month and honor the thousands of social workers across Maine who dedicate their lives to supporting individuals, families and communities.

As a licensed social worker who's been practicing here in the State of Maine for over 30 years, I've seen firsthand how our profession impacts the lives of others, not just clinically but also in the public policy arena, where we can truly impact positive systemic change. This year's theme, Social Workers Uplift, Defend, Transform, captures the heart of our profession. Every day, social workers uplift people during some of the most difficult moments in their lives. We defend the rights and dignity of those who are too often unheard. And we work to transform systems, so that every person has the opportunity to live with safety, stability and hope.

Social workers truly touch every aspect of our lives. We support children and families, help older adults maintain independence and dignity, provide critical mental health care and assist veterans and their families as they return home from service. We advocate for safe environments, quality education and fair treatment for all people, regardless of race, background or income. Across our State, Mr. Speaker, social workers stand with those who are vulnerable, marginalized or are facing crisis. We strengthen communities, connect people with essential services and work every day to build a more just and compassionate society.

Today, we recognize social work as a profession and renew our commitment to this vital field by thanking the social workers who uplift, defend and transform lives across our State

every single day. And I will add, Mr. Speaker, this is the eighth year that I have put this Joint Resolution forward honoring our profession, and we are losing a number of our colleagues in the social work profession due to term limits and various other reasons, and so, I'm looking forward to somebody coming behind me who can continue honoring this important work that we do as social workers. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The **SPEAKER**: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Wales, Representative Greenwood.

Representative **GREENWOOD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise today in support of social workers. I have many social worker friends. I admire the work they do. But what I can't support is a piece in here that is a direct conflict with federal law.

I use the analogy of, I can support you 99% of the time, but when you put that drop of poison in there, it's still poison. Mr. Speaker, the well has been poisoned with this document right here with an item that is in direct conflict. Mr. Speaker, I have a daughter, and I will support my daughter and girls first. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Biddeford, Representative Malon.

Representative **MALON**: Mr. Speaker, as a proud so-called girl dad myself, I do not consider the provision that the Representative from Wales is speaking of to be poison. I support the pending motion.

The **SPEAKER**: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I worked in the ICU for a long time, and I've worked with many wonderful social workers. But that's not why I'm standing up to object to this Resolution today.

I, like the Good Representative, object to one specific piece of this Resolution. And I do so because I think that we are doing great harm to our young people in Maine and across the country supporting an ideology that is based on a lie.

Mr. Speaker, within the last week, the Supreme Court ruled that a California law that would restrict when schools can impart information to parents about their student, specifically that their student has asked to be referred to as --

Representative **MILLIKEN**: Point of Order.

The **SPEAKER**: The Member will defer. The Chair will inquire as to why the Representative from Blue Hill rises.

Representative **MILLIKEN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm wondering what this has to do with the Joint Resolution pending before us.

On **POINT OF ORDER**, Representative MILLIKEN of Blue Hill asked the Chair if the remarks of Representative LIBBY of Auburn were germane to the pending question.

The **SPEAKER**: The Chair would rule that the Joint Resolution speaks to the issue of the rights that I believe were being debated at the Supreme Court. Therefore, the Member's comments are in order.

The Chair **RULED** that the remarks of Representative LIBBY of Auburn were germane to the pending question.

The **SPEAKER**: The Member may proceed.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, last week, the Supreme Court blocked a California law that was intended to ensure that parental rights were infringed and that parents were not informed when their child

wanted to be referred to as a different gender than they actually are.

Mr. Speaker, we have a similar law here in Maine. I think it's reprehensible and infringes on parental rights and it is directly related to this Resolution and this line that specifically refers to transgender rights. Mr. Speaker, any individual of any profession that is supporting the lie that a boy can become a girl or that a girl can become a boy is perpetrating harm against children. And it is for that reason that I cannot support this Resolution, as much as I appreciate the good work of many social workers. Thank you.

Representative **HENDERSON**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ladies and gentlemen of many faiths. The beauty of this country and one of the things that I love about her from coast to coast is that all can come and worship here; is that we, each of us, whether we choose to worship or not, have a God-given and constitutionally protected right to worship freely of our choosing.

The freedom of religion is a freedom that we don't have to be under a state-sanctioned or state-mandated religion, but that we can choose the God in whom we serve. This is a freedom that I support. It's a freedom that I exercise and a freedom that I benefit from daily. Just today, I walked the halls of this building in prayer and prayerfulness, asking God for direction.

I have such a deep love for many walks of life, many of those from different creeds and color, and at times it's created a conflict within me, because that love that comes from me is one that's not of myself, but is supernatural and it loves those that think differently than I do, that talk differently than I do and that walk differently than I do. I have a love for many in this room, in this State and the nation. But the deepness of the roots of my faith demand and require that I don't participate in any worship other than the worship of God Jehovah.

I'm thankful that this Resolution exists. I'm thankful that it's before the Body today. Because it is, in and of itself, a reflection of the very freedom that I support and that I benefit from and that I exercise. I support the existence of this

Resolution, and I do not support the content of the Resolution. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brunswick, Representative Ankeles.

Representative **ANKELES**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising because there's a very small number of legislators here are either Jewish or Muslim and across the world, it's a very fraught time in international relations, and I wanted to rise as one of the Jewish Members to wish our Muslim Members a Ramadan Mubarak since this Resolution is before us. I'm no fan of Joint Resolutions, but since this is here, I was thinking about the fraught situation internationally and thought, well, here in America, here in Maine, we can still lead with love. And so, I just wanted to express that to my Muslim colleagues and in support of this Resolution today. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative **ARATA**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise today in support of this motion and as a Christian.

Although we do not serve the same God or worship the same God as Muslims, I know that my God loves Muslim people. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Chelsea, Representative Lemelin.

Representative **LEMELIN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Although it would seem that we have a child care affordability and other child care issues, I oppose this bill because I am under the belief that we are personally responsible for the child care of our children.

Back in the day, it was basically babysitting, and now it's turned into education. You see kids two, three years old being

educated. And so, these child care centers are spending exuberant amounts of money to bring in teachers, *et cetera*, when it's really not necessary. I believe that parents need to go back to the old way, where you had family members care for them or one of the parents would work. Somebody just came up to me and mentioned how they had to work certain hours and their husband worked other hours and you just worked it out. It's not the place of the State to babysit our kids and to pay for that babysitting. There are extreme conditions where there is a single parent who can't possibly make enough money, and we have services already in place for this.

So, I think what we need to do is start thinking about our roles as parents. I had to do it, nobody from the State came running to me and said, hey, don't worry about it, we'll help defer the cost of child care. We had to do it. Including my son with special needs, nobody came running to me to help me. Nobody. And I don't have family up here, my family's an hour away and they have been the whole time. I didn't get that help, I made it and both my wife and I are both professionals, but we made it. It's called sacrificing.

Now, like I said, to some people, it's not just a sacrifice, it's overwhelming, but that's a very, very small number. What we're doing here is forcing taxpayers to pay for a lifestyle that we choose. That's not right, Mr. Speaker. So, it's not a matter of me not having the compassion for those certain individuals that truly need the help. These bills that are coming up are the opposite, they're to help everyone and I just don't believe that's necessary and especially the educator part. I don't care if people want to stand up and tell me how all these studies have proven how much greater kids are when they're educated from three years on. My kids weren't educated from three years on and they're very successful. I believe it's up to the parents to educate their children at a young age. I just can't be for this bill. So, thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eliot, Representative Meyer.

Representative MEYER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Women and Men of the House. The Child Care Affordability Program, or CCAP, is foundational support for working families across our State. Yet over 600 of those families, that's about 830 children, remain on a waitlist, unable to access affordable child care that would allow their parents to work. Investment in this program is necessary to move families off the waitlist and ensure that child care is not a barrier to economic participation.

Now, we know that women are disproportionately impacted by a lack of affordable child care. Many in this income bracket who would choose to work and build their careers are forced to make a very different choice for themselves and their families. Child care costs are often the deciding factor that lead women to pause or leave their careers, reducing their long-term economic mobility. A truly sustainable child care system must serve all families who qualify, ensure consistent funding and remove child care as a barrier to economic participation and gender equity. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Zager.

Representative ZAGER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will be brief, and I'm only going to speak on this bill, even though it's closely tied with some other business we have before us.

I recognize that people may look at the question before us and do a thought experiment, and that's perfectly valid, we all have different ways of assessing how we're going to vote. I will point out that these are not exorbitant salaries that our child care workers receive. They are bottom two to three percent of

the salary scale in the State. So, it's not exorbitant. And as far as what is the; you can think of it as the return on investment, the cost-benefit ratio; for those of us in the Chamber who want to be analytical as well as evaluate things based on philosophy and our heart, the business-friendly organization, ReadyNation, described as a business leader organization dedicated to building a skilled workforce and a strong economy, Mr. Speaker, testified showing the study, and it's linked if people want to look in the Committee testimony, there's a link under ReadyNation. It found that in Maine, the lack of child care for children just up to age three costs our State economy over \$400 million a year. Four hundred million dollars a year in our economy because we are not investing in things like this. This is a good deal for the State, Mr. Speaker. Four hundred million dollars a year we are foregoing because of lack of child care up to age three. That more than doubled since 2019.

So, that's just additional food for thought. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby.

Representative LIBBY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, putting lifestyle choices aside, it's not the proper role of government to simply throw more money at a solution, or it shouldn't be, it shouldn't be the first thing we look to. This has a \$15 million Fiscal Note; I cannot support that. I do support reforms that will increase the amount of child care that we have available in our State. And frankly, we can do that by simply getting government out of the way.

Let me read a few things that we could do instead of putting \$15 million more of taxpayer funding toward the solution. We could raise the threshold for license-exempt home child care and ensure that folks could care for up to six children. Mr. Speaker, let me tell you, I had nine kids in my house, friends of my children, over February vacation and while it was a little chaotic, I can tell you that as a Mom, I can competently care for six kids at a time, that's for sure.

Mr. Speaker, we could relax staff to child ratio rules carefully and considerably. We could preempt local zoning bans on home daycares. That could be done at the local level. We could simplify licensing tiers. We could recognize alternative staff credentials. We could allow more shared-space child care. We could encourage employer-run micro daycares. We could streamline inspections and paperwork. We could expand family, friend, neighbor care exemptions. We could reduce physical facility mandates.

We could do many, many, many things to encourage the growth and expansion of responsible child care here in our State that don't involve throwing \$15 million of taxpayer funding at it. Let's provide some real solutions to change the policies in our State instead of simply trying to allocate more money that Mainers do not have.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Harpswell, Representative Golek.

Representative GOLEK: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I didn't plan on standing and talking today, and I want to add a little bit of a different perspective and some information towards this bill.

One, without child care support, I would not be where I am today. I stand here as a person who was a single mother with two children. Somebody who Social Security's been taking money out of me since I was 12 and found myself unable to work, because I was still working, but my child care costs left me with \$25 a week to put back into my tank to go back to work. Finally, I came down off a waiting list and was

allowed to get a child care voucher. All of our lives changed after that. Stability in child care allowed me to work, it allowed me to work more, but it also allowed me to continue my education and to build goals for my family.

I share that as a personal experience because I know many have personal experiences with child care, with my peers. But I also want to highlight five important benefits that child care bring in lasting positive impacts. And I'm highlighting these because when we're talking about a population that needs help with child care, we are almost always talking about a lower-income population of people that we supposedly have a ladder to help them climb up. This bill helps fix one of those broken steps in the ladder and will help people continue to climb to where they deserve to be able to be.

So, the five things is, research shows that access to high quality early learning programs can significantly reduce educational opportunity gaps between children from diverse socioeconomic backgrounds at the time of kindergarten entry with readiness being a key predictor of academic success. Two, children enrolled in quality early learning programs tend to have graduation rates with a six percent increase in high school graduation and a 5.5 increase in college attendance rates being linked to their participation in early child care education. Adults who receive quality early child care are more likely to be employed full-time, become homeowners and maintain savings accounts. Participation in early child care programs is associated with long-term health benefits, including lower rates of depression, reduced alcohol and tobacco use and a decrease in the prevalence of cardiovascular diseases. Evidence suggests that early childhood education enhances parenting practices, benefitting children during the program and later years in life.

And I will stop there. There is much more that I could say about the critical need for the child care infrastructure in our State and the role that our State plays and child care is. Bottom line is, it is the backbone to our entire economy. So, I urge my colleagues to support this vote before us. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Presque Isle, Representative Underwood.

Representative **UNDERWOOD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The only thing I have to say on this particular bill is, please vote no. Government has no business in the child-rearing business. And everybody in here has a mother and a father, a male and a female, and they are responsible for raising children and giving them moral values. Mine did and I'm sure yours did also. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**: The Representative from Wales, Representative Greenwood, has requested unanimous consent to address the House on the record. Hearing no objection, it is so ordered. The Member may proceed.

Representative **GREENWOOD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Had I been in my seat for Roll Call 619, LD 524, I would have voted yes; Roll Call No. 620, LD 2004, I would have voted yes; Roll Call 621, LD 2011, I would have voted yes; Roll Call 622, LD 1587, I would have voted no; Roll Call 623, LD 1975, I would have voted no; Roll Call 624, SP 901, I would have voted yes; Roll Call 626, LD 2147, I would have voted no; Roll Call 627, LD 2037, I would have voted no. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to request unanimous consent to speak on the record.

The **SPEAKER**: The Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby, has requested unanimous consent to address the House on the record. Hearing no objection, it is so ordered. The Member may proceed.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I wanted to let folks know that March is Women's History Month and read into the record a document that expresses exactly where we are in our status with women in history.

Hi. My name is Katie Mountain. I am an inmate at Maine Correctional Center. I knew coming to serve my 10-month sentence wouldn't be a walk in the park, but I never thought in a million years it would be a straight nightmare from hell. I'm hoping by sending my story out to the world I might get some help, not only for me but for the women who come after me.

I'm a 40-year-old Baptist married woman. I came to MCC in December and stayed in Foxtrot, or the Pods, as they say, for the first 11 days, before they moved me up to the women's center. I was moved to B walk; quad. I don't think there's a reason they call it that anymore, because it houses six inmates, but it used to only house four. When moving into this quad, I was forced into a situation of sharing a bunk with a male inmate. This inmate claims to be transgender, but physically is still male and has a very masculine personality. He makes jokes like, sorry, I can't help you, but I can put a baby in you.

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. The Chair will remind the Member of a guidance that the Chair provided to the Body just a few days ago about not extending debate on policy matters and other things that were not announcements about things that are happening around the State House. I think the Chair provided that guidance, it has been followed, I don't think that this is following that guidance. I think we can agree on that. And the Chair would ask the Member to; I think these comments are worth making in many ways and many venues. This is announcements from the floor related to matters happening here at the State House, in our districts and so forth, regarding events, and I don't want to have to move to a place where we don't do announcements. I said that a few days ago, and I'm afraid that this is going down that road where we're going to just not have announcements anymore.

The Member may proceed.

Representative **LIBBY**: At what point would it be appropriate to speak to the state of women in Maine, particularly women who are currently and continue to be in harm's way because of Maine policy? Where and when is that appropriate, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER: So, the Chair would advise the Member that all Members here have platforms that extend well beyond speaking here on the floor. Of course, any Member in this Body is welcome to speak to these issues on all platforms, on all mediums that they have access to. Holding a press conference, we see that all the time. Having comments made and shared on any platform. I think the point of the matter here; and should this issue be before us as a matter that's being debated through a bill. There's not a bill before us, and that would be the Speaker's guidance, the Chair's guidance to the Body.

By unanimous consent, all matters having been acted upon were **ORDERED SENT FORTHWITH**.
