Committee report LD 353 - the Biennial Budget for 2009-10 and 2010-11

The Joint Standing Committee on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife voted 10-2 to support those provisions of the Governor's biennial budget (LD 353) within the jurisdiction of the committee provided the budget is amended as proposed in this memorandum. Our committee has worked extremely hard to reach the level of agreement we have on these recommendations. We have balanced the department's biennial budget while providing a number of new opportunities for sportsman. Some of those opportunities include giving youth hunters complementary big game hunting permits to encourage youth participation in hunting and to allowing hunters to take an additional turkey during the spring wild turkey hunt. Additionally, we provide critical oxygen supplies to our fish hatcheries and maintain a number of positions within the department that we feel are vital if the department is going to maintain its current level of service to the public.

We strongly recommend that LD 353 be amended as follows:

- 1. Page IFW-27, Ref.# 2795 Retain the 3-day nonresident snowmobile option and direct the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to create one registration that can be used for both the 3-day and seasonal nonresident snowmobile registration (see attached A Part OO);
- 2. IFW 38, Ref. # 2817 Transfers the General Fund portion of one Biologist I position to the Other Special Revenues Fund (see Attachment B);
- 3. Page IFW 41, Ref# 2831 Restore the 2 Office I positions through an increase in big game tags (see Attached A);

- 4. IFW 41, Ref.# 2780 Reduces funding by transferring Office of Information Technology costs from the General Fund to Other Special Revenues Funds (see Attachment C);
- 5. IFW 42, Ref.# 2819 –Restore the 2 biologist I positions by the transfer of Federal Funds into that account (see Attachments B,C and D);
- 6. IFW 42, Ref.# 2820 Reallocates 33 positions to 30% General Fund and 70% Federal Expenditure Fund within the same program (see Attachment D);
- 7. IFW 52, All of Part I Remove the repeal of the Fiscal Stability Programs 18% requirement but suspend its application for the 2012- 2013 biennial budget (see Attachment I);
- 8. IFW 53, Part OO. Strike all of Part OO and replace it with the committee's amendment that contains a number of initiatives to make up revenues that were proposed in Part OO by the Governor (see Attachment A);
- 9. Add a new initiative to establish 2 full time Biologist Specialist positions in the Endangered Nongame Operations program to be funded 50% federal money and 50% General Fund (see attachment E);
- 10. Add a new initiative that establishes 1 limited –period Biology Specialist position in the Resource Management Wildlife program to be funded 75% Federal Expenditure fund and %25 Other Special Revenue Fund. The position would end June 11, 2011 (see Attachment F);
- 11. Hold open 3 vacancies within the Warden Service for two years (see Attachment G);
- 12. Provide an attrition factor of 5% for the department ending on June 30, 2010 with 1.6% going the General Fund and 3.4% going to the department. Also provide a 5% attrition factor for fiscal year ending on June 30, 2011 with all of that money going to the department (see Attachment J).
- 13. Strike and replace Part CCC with the attached committee amendment (see Attachment H).

While we worked to obtain a unanimous report on this budget there were two members at our last budget work session that could not support our recommendations. However, one of those committee members, Rep. Mcleod, supported all of our recommendations except the language that would raise certain resident license fees. To make up revenues lost by not raising fees on residents, Rep. McLeod proposes to raise the hunt/combo/archery/fish licenses for nonresidents by \$16 and all other nonresident licenses and permits by \$10. This would raise an amount equivalent to the amount raised by the license and permit fee increases contained in our recommendations.

Amend the bill by striking Part OO and replacing it with the following:

PART 00

Sec. OO-1. 12 MRSA §10262, is enacted to read:

§10262. Energy Fund

- 1. Fund established. The Energy Fund, referred to in this section as the "fund," is established in the department's Bureau of Administrative Services. All funds appropriated to the department for energy related costs must be deposited in this fund. The commissioner may accept funds from any source that must be used for the purposes of this fund. The fund may be used only for energy related expenses and maintenance of department owned or leased facilities. Money in the fund at the end of a fiscal year does not lapse and must be carried forward to the next fiscal year.
- **Sec. OO-2. 12 MRSA §11109, sub-§3,** as amended by PL 2007, c. 168, §§2 and 3 and affected by §8 and amended by c. 203, §§7 to 9, is further amended to read:
- 3. Hunting licenses; combination licenses; fees. Hunting licenses, combination licenses and fees are as follows.
- A. A resident junior hunting license, for a person 10 years of age or older and under 16 years of age, is \$7. Notwithstanding the permit fees established in subchapter 3, a junior hunting license includes all permits, stamps and other permissions needed to hunt at no additional cost.
 - B. A resident hunting license, for a person 16 years of age or older, is \$23 21.
- C. A resident small game hunting license, for a person 16 years of age or older, which permits hunting for all legal species except deer, bear, turkey, moose, raccoon and bobcat, is \$14.
 - D. A resident combination hunting and fishing license is \$40 38.
 - E. A resident combination archery hunting and fishing license is \$40.38.
- E-1. A resident apprenticeship hunter license, which includes a bear hunting permit and a wild turkey hunting permit under sections 11151 and 11155 respectively, is \$21.
- F. A nonresident junior hunting license, for a person 10 years of age or older and under 16 years of age, is \$29 27.
- G. A nonresident small game hunting license, which permits hunting of all legal species except deer, bear, turkey, moose, raccoon and bobcat, is \$69 67.
- H. A nonresident 3-day small game hunting license, valid for 3 consecutive hunting days, which permits hunting of all legal species except deer, bear, turkey, moose, raccoon and bobcat for the 72-hour period specified on the license, is \$44 42.

- I. A nonresident big game hunting license, which permits hunting of all legal species subject to the permit requirements in chapter 915, subchapter 3, is \$108 402.
 - J. A nonresident combination hunting and fishing license is \$143 137.
- K. An alien small game hunting license, which permits hunting of all species except deer, bear, turkey, moose, raccoon and bobcat, is \$74.72.
- L. An alien big game hunting license, which permits hunting of all legal species subject to the permit requirements in chapter 915, subchapter 3, is \$133 127.
 - M. An alien combination hunting and fishing license is \$184 178.
- N. A license to use leashed dogs to track wounded animals, which permits a person to use one or more leashed dogs to track a lawfully wounded deer, moose or bear, is \$27.
- O. A nonresident small game apprenticeship hunter license, which permits the hunting of all legal species except deer, bear, turkey, moose, raccoon and bobcat, is \$69 67.
- P. A nonresident big game apprenticeship hunter license, which permits the hunting of all legal species and includes a bear hunting permit and a wild turkey hunting permit under sections 11151 and 11155 respectively, is \$104 102.
- **Sec. OO-3. 12 MRSA §11109, sub-§5,** as amended by PL 2005, c. 397, Pt. E, §7, is further amended to read:
- 5. Muzzle-loading permits and fees. Muzzle-loading hunting permits and fees are as follows:
 - A. A resident muzzle-loading hunting permit is \$13;
 - B. A nonresident muzzle-loading hunting permit is $\$\underline{64}$ 62; and
 - C. An alien muzzle-loading hunting permit is \$74.72.
- Sec. OO-4. 12 MRSA §11109, sub-§7, as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §5, is further amended to read:
- 7. Archery hunting licenses; combination licenses; fees. Archery hunting licenses, combination licenses and fees are as follows:
 - A. A resident archery license is \$23 21;
 - B. A resident combination archery hunting and fishing license is \$40 38;
 - C. A nonresident archery license is \$68 62; and
 - D. An alien archery license is \$78 72.
- Sec. OO-5. 12 MRSA §11109, sub-§9, as enacted by PL 2005, c. 419, §5 and affected by §12, is amended to read:
- 9. Crossbow licenses and fees. Crossbow hunting licenses and fees are as follows:
 - A. A resident crossbow hunting license is \$25;
 - B. A nonresident crossbow hunting license is \$50 48; and
 - C. An alien crossbow hunting license is \$74.72.
- Sec. OO-6. 12 MRSA §11151, sub-§3, as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §7, is further amended to read:

- 3. Issuance; permit fee. The commissioner, through the commissioner's authorized agent, shall issue a bear hunting permit to an eligible person. The annual fee for each permit issued is \$27 for residents and \$69 67 for nonresidents.
- Sec. OO-7. 12 MRSA §11154, sub-§3, as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §9, is further amended to read:
- **3. Moose hunting permit fee.** The fee for a moose hunting permit is \$52 for a resident and \$479 477 for a nonresident or alien.
- Sec. OO-8. 12 MRSA §11155, sub-§1-B, as enacted by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §11, is amended to read:
 - 1-B. Issuance; permit fee. The commissioner, through the commissioner's authorized agent, shall issue a wild turkey hunting permit to an eligible person. The annual fee for a wild turkey hunting permit is \$20 for residents and \$49 47 for nonresidents and aliens. The fee for a spring hunt wild turkey permit that allows the take of 2 male wild turkeys is \$40 for residents and \$98 for nonresidents.

Sec. OO-9. 12 MRSA §11701, is amended to read:

§11701. Authority of commissioner; wild turkey hunting

Except as provided in this section, the commissioner may establish open seasons for hunting wild turkeys, designate areas that are open to the taking of wild turkeys in any part of the State, prescribe the form and regulate the number of permits to be issued, determine the number and sex of the birds to be harvested, establish bag limits except that during a spring wild turkey hunt the bag limit is two male wild turkeys, establish permit eligibility requirements, establish legal hunting times, specify the types of weapons to be used during any open wild turkey hunting season and make any other rules that the commissioner considers necessary for the protection of the wild turkey resource.

A person who violates this section commits a Class E crime for which the court shall impose a fine of not less than \$500, none of which may be suspended. The court also shall impose a fine of \$500 for each turkey unlawfully possessed, none of which may be suspended.

- **Sec. OO-10. 12 MRSA §12201, sub-§6,** as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §23, is further amended to read:
 - 6. Trapping fees. The fees for trapping licenses are as follows:

 - C. A nonresident trapping license is \$312 310.

Sec. OO-11. 12 MRSA §12301, sub-§3, is amended to read:

- 3. Agent duties. Registration agents shall:
- A. Register every bear, deer, moose or wild turkey legally presented for registration;
- B. Attach a seal to each bear, deer, moose or wild turkey in the manner directed and with the materials furnished by the commissioner; and
- C. Collect <u>\$5</u> and retain \$1 for each seal from the person registering a bear, deer, moose or wild turkey. <u>The remaining \$4 must be returned to the department by the agent pursuant to section 10801, subsection 3.</u>
- Sec. OO-12. 12 MRSA §12501, sub-§6, as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. III, §24, is further amended to read:
 - 6. Schedule of fees. The fees for fishing licenses are as follows.
 - A. A resident fishing license is \$23 21.
 - B. A resident combination hunting and fishing license is \$40 38.
 - C. A resident combination archery hunting and fishing license is \$40 38.
- D. A nonresident junior fishing license, for persons 12 years of age or older and under 16 years of age, is \$11 9.
- E. A 3-day fishing license for a resident or nonresident, valid for the 72-hour period specified on the license, is \$23 for a resident and \$25 for a nonresident.
- F. A nonresident 7-day fishing license, valid for 7 days from date indicated on license, is \$38.36.
- G. A nonresident 15-day fishing license, valid for 15 days from date indicated on license, is \$42.40.
- H. A nonresident season fishing license for persons 16 years of age or older is \$58 52.
 - I. An alien season fishing license for persons 16 years of age or older is \$78.72.
- J. A one-day fishing license for a resident or nonresident, valid for the 24-hour period indicated on license, for a resident is \$11 and for a nonresident is \$13.

Sec. OO-13. 12 MRSA §12912, sub-§1, is amended to read:

- 1. User fee. This subsection applies to the payment of user fees by outfitters carrying passengers on rapidly flowing rivers.
 - A. Each outfitter shall:
- (1) Pay a user fee of \$2 1-per passenger, excluding guides, carried by the outfitter on any whitewater trip; and
- (2) Pay this fee by the 30th day of the month following the month in which the passengers were carried.
 - B. The following penalties apply to violations of paragraph A.
- (1) A person who violates paragraph A commits a civil violation for which a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 may be adjudged.

Sec. OO-15. 12 MRSA §13058, sub-§ 1, is amended to read:

§13058. Lake and river protection sticker required

- 1. Prohibition. A person exempt from the certificate of number requirement pursuant to section 13056, subsection 2, paragraph B may not place or operate a motorboat, or personal watercraft or sea plane on the inland waters of the State unless a valid lake and river protection sticker issued annually under subsection 3 is permanently affixed to:
- A. Each side of the bow of a motorboat or personal watercraft above the water line and approximately 3 inches behind the validation sticker required under section 13056.
- B. Each outside edge of a sea plane's pontoons so that the entire sticker is visible above the water line when the sea plane is resting on the water.

This sticker is nontransferable.

Sec. OO-16. 12 MRSA §13104, sub-§1, paragraph F, is amended to read:

- F. The following penalties apply to violations of this subsection.
- (1) A person who violates this subsection commits a civil violation for which a fine of not less than $$200 \ 100$ nor more than $$500 \ \text{may}$ be adjudged.
- (2) A person who violates this subsection after having been adjudicated as having committed 3 or more civil violations under this Part within the previous 5-year period commits a Class E crime.

Sec. OO-17. 12 MRSA §13104, sub-§3 and 4, are amended to read:

- **3. Form of registration.** The snowmobile registration must be in such form as the commissioner may determine except the commissioner shall develop a single form of registration that can be used for either the 3-day or seasonal nonresident registrations.
- **4. Fee.** Except as provided in subsection 5, the annual snowmobile registration fee is as follows:
- A. For residents, \$35. The registration for a snowmobile owned by a resident is valid for one year, commencing on July 1st of each year.
 - B. For nonresidents:

- (1) Forty-three dollars for a 3-consecutive-day registration. A person may purchase more than one 3-day registration in any season;
- (2) Fifty-eight dollars for a 10 consecutive day registration. A person may purchase more than one 10 day registration in any season; and
 - (3) Eighty-eight dollars for a seasonal registration.

The registration for a snowmobile owned by a nonresident must specify the dates for which the registration is valid.

Five dollars from each registration fee collected pursuant to this subsection must be transferred to a special fund administered by the Off-Road Vehicle Division of the Bureau of Parks and Lands within the Department of Conservation. The funds must be used to assist any entity that has a snowmobile trail-grooming contract with the bureau in the purchase of trail-grooming equipment.

Two dollars from each resident snowmobile registration fee must be transferred to the Snowmobile Trail Fund of the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Parks and Lands.

Sec. OO-18. 12 MRSA §13155, sub-§1-A, paragraph B, is amended to read:

- B. The following penalties apply to violations of this subsection.
- (1) A person who violates this subsection commits a civil violation for which a fine of not less than \$200 100 nor more than \$500 may be adjudged.
- (2) A person who violates this subsection after having been adjudicated as having committed 3 or more civil violations under this Part within the previous 5-year period commits a Class E crime.

SUMMARY

This amendment strikes and replaces Part OO with the following:

- 1. Establishes and Energy Fund within the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife;
- 2. Increases certain nonresident and alien hunting license fees by \$6 and all other nonresident and alien licenses and permits fees by \$2;
- 3. Increases the resident hunting license, combination hunting and fishing license, combination archery and fishing license, archery license and fishing license fees by \$2;
- 4. Provides that a junior hunting license includes all permits, stamps and other permissions needed to hunt at no additional cost;
- 5. Creates a spring turkey hunt permit to allow the holder to take two male wild turkeys during the spring hunt;
- 6. Increase the fee for deer, bear, moose and wild turkey registration tags from \$1 to \$5;
- 7. Increases the user fee for whitewater rafting from \$1 to \$2;
- 8. Requires sea planes that are operated on inland waters to have a milfoil sticker;
- 9. Increases the minimum penalty for operating an unregistered recreational vehicle from \$100 to \$200; and

10. It eliminates the nonresident 10-day snowmobile registration and directs the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to develop a single form of registration that can be used for either a 3-day or a seasonal nonresident snowmobile registration.

Sec. CCC-2. Transfer; Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Carrying Balances –Fisheries and Hatchery Division.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, on or before September 1, 2010, the State Controller shall transfer \$255,000 from the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, Carrying Balances account, to the Fisheries and Hatcheries Operations program to fund the General Fund portion of 2 Fisheries Biology Specialists positions and to partially fund fish hatchery operational costs for fiscal year 20109-11.

SUMMARY

This amendment replaces Part CCC with language to transfer funds from the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, Carrying Balances account, to the Fisheries and Hatcheries Operations program to fund 2 Fisheries Biology Specialists positions and to partially fund fish hatchery operational costs for fiscal years 2009-10 and 2010-11.

PART I

Sec. I-1. 12 MRSA § 10202, sub-§ 9, is amended to read:

9. Fiscal Stability Program. The Fiscal Stability Program is established to ensure that the general public and hunters and anglers share the cost of the fish and wildlife conservation programs of the department. To achieve this goal, beginning with the <u>2012-2013</u> <u>2010-2011</u> biennial budget and for each biennial budget thereafter, the biennial budget submitted by the executive branch must include an additional General Fund appropriation of 18% in excess of the department's requested biennial budget.

SUMMARY

This amendment strikes and replaces PART I of the budget with language that suspends the application of the Fiscal Stability Program to 2012-13 biennial budget.

ATTACHMENT J

PART AA

Sec. AA-1. Calculation and transfer; attrition savings. The attrition rate for the 2010-2011 biennium is increased from 1.6% to 5.0%. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the State Budget Officer shall calculate the amount of savings identified in the Statewide Attrition account within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services in Part A that applies against each General Fund account for all departments and agencies statewide and shall transfer the amounts by financial order upon the approval of the Governor. These transfers are considered adjustments to appropriations in fiscal years 2009-10 and 2010-11.

Sec. AA-2. Calculation and transfer: Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife attrition savings. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the attrition factor for the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife will not exceed 1.6% for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010. This portion of attrition factor shall be calculated and transferred to the General Fund. The state budget officer shall calculate and transfer an additional 3.4% attrition factor which shall stay within the general fund of Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

Sec. AA-3. Calculation and transfer: Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife attrition savings. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the attrition factor for the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife will be 5% for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011. The state budget officer shall calculate and transfer the 5% attrition factor which shall stay within the general fund of the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

SUMMARY

This amendment provides that the attrition factor for the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife will not exceed 1.6% for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 and that this portion of attrition factor must transferred to the General Fund. Additionally a 3.4% attrition factor must be calculated and will stay within the general fund of Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for the same fiscal year. It also provides that the attrition factor for the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife will be 5% for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011 and that amount must stay within the general fund of the Department on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.
