# Recommendations on initiatives not proposed by LD 1043

Maine Advisory Commission on Women Veterans/Women Veterans Coordinator: The Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee unanimously supports an initiative that establishes a fund to provide a stipend in FY 12 and FY 13 for a Women Veterans Coordinator within the Department of Defense Veterans and Emergency Management, Bureau of Veterans Services. The stipend for this position is \$12,500 each year. In addition, these members also support providing funding for expenses, travel reimbursement, and conference attendance fees for the Maine Advisory Commission on Women Veterans for FY 12 in the amount of \$7,500. The funding for the stipend and expenses in FY 12 will be offset by deappropriating (FY 11) Personal Services Savings from 2 vacant positions recently approved for the Gambling Control Board in the Supplemental Budget (LD 100). The positions, budgeted to start in mid-March, will not be filled prior to May 1st 2011. The Personal Services savings is equal to \$20,118 according to information received from the Department of Public Safety. This savings is sufficient to cover the stipend and expenses for FY 12. After discussion at a second worksession, the committee proposed to fund the stipend and expenses for FY 13 by deappropriating All Other savings from the due diligence money approved for the Gambling Control Board in the supplemental budget for work necessary to consider the application for the Oxford County Casino. Recognizing that there has been no receipt of an application for the Oxford casino, we estimate the savings from that, to date, is approximately \$47,000 since enactment of LD 100. We will provide statutory language that ensures that this fund is administered by Bureau of Veterans Services and that there is an annual report to VLA about the use of this money. It is our hope that the need to highlight the lapses in the care and recognition of our women veterans will be unnecessary and thus, we are proposing a sunset to these provisions in 6 years.

Annual \$2 Million transfer to the Maine Clean Election Fund: Title 21-A \$1124, sub-\$2 provides for the annual transfer of General Fund dollars to the Maine Clean Election Fund on January 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. In recent years, the Commission has requested that the date of transfer be moved to an earlier date of September 1<sup>st</sup>, and the Legislature 100 STATE HOUSE STATION, AUGUSTA, MAINE 04333-0100 TELEPHONE 207-287-1310

has responded favorably to that request. We unanimously recommend that the final report on LD 1043 include language that amends this section to permanently change this date to September1st beginning in 2011. (Vote on 3/25/2011: Farnham, Patrick, Beaulieu, Crockett, Damon, Valentino, Johnson, Carey, Longstaff, Russell)

Funding 1.5 positions within the Bureau of Elections and Corporations: Deputy Secretary of State, Julie Flynn presented us with a compelling argument to find funding for a full-time central voter registration manager position and a half-time assistant director of elections. These positions had been paid for by the General Fund in the past, but in 2006 in order to save General Fund money, those positions were paid for using federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA) money. A majority (8) wants to express its support for funding these positions even though we were unable to find money within our area of jurisdiction. (Vote on 4/6/2011: Farnham, Plowman, Beaulieu, Chipman, Crockett, Damon, Johnson, Willette) Although the committee unanimously recognizes the importance of the two positions, a minority opposed the initiative because they believe that the Secretary of State has the option to self-fund these positions but has placed other spending initiatives within its department as a higher priority. In addition, the minority opposed to this initiative believe that there will be HAVA money available to fund these positions through the biennium. # Recommendations on initiatives proposed by LD 1043

The Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs voted unanimously to support all but 2 of the budget initiatives as proposed by the Governor's budget. The committee voted to reject one Other Special Revenue spending proposal at the request of the Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices. The committee also unanimously voted to delay consideration of the continuation of two positions within the Gambling Control Board. The table below summarizes the committee's votes on the initiatives proposed by LD 1043.

- Although the committee understands the importance of continuing these 2 positions within the Gambling Control Board, we feel it is important to take the necessary time to review those in the larger context of considering necessary changes to the staffing level of the Board in recognition of the expansion of oversight and regulation required with the operation of a casino in Oxford County.
- The Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee recognizes that they will need to pay ongoing attention to the expansion of the Gambling Control Board to accommodate the future licensing and oversight of the Oxford County Casino. We recognize the biennial budget is the best place to consider such an initiative, however, there are too many factors that are still unknown but necessary to guide us through the development of that policy at this time. It is our intent to continue consideration of this policy matter as information regarding the anticipated start-date of the casino, projected revenues, and the hiring of a new Executive Director become available. We request that you reserve action on this initiative until we have been able to better recommend a course of action on broader changes to staffing of the Gambling Control Board.

The Election Division supervises and administers all state elections for federal, state and county offices and referenda. ## Justification:
