

§3853. Writ for enforcement

The form of writ for enforcing such lien must be in substance as follows:

"State of Maine.

....., ss.

To the sheriff of our County of, or either of the sheriff's deputies:

We command you to attach the vessel" (here give such a description of the vessel as will identify it,) "in an action brought by" (name of plaintiff) "of" (plaintiff's place of residence including town and county) "against" (name of defendant) "of" (defendant's place of residence including town and county) "in the Superior Court for the County of, in which action" (name of plaintiff) "claims a lien on such vessel for" (here describe briefly the nature of the lien) "to the amount of dollars and cents, and make due return of this writ with your doings thereon.

Clerk of Superior Court

(Seal of the court)

The action shall be brought in the county where the vessel is.
