THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Turner.

Senator **TURNER**: Thank you, Madame President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I would ask that you not support the motion before us. This matter has to do with the so-called Rule 850, which is the most restrictive matter facing those who seek medical coverage and where their insurance carriers can ask them to secure that coverage. We did make some previsions, as many of you know, within Dirigo Health to provide some limited expansion. That expansion has not taken place and further, it is my opinion, and I hope you will agree, that continuing to place restrictions like Rule 850 do nothing to reduce the cost of health care for all of us in Maine. I would ask that you vote against the motion put forth by the good Senator from York, Senator LaFountain.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator LaFountain.

Senator **LAFOUNTAIN**: Thank you, Madame President, men and women of the Senate. I rise to encourage you to support the pending motion, which is the Majority Ought Not to Pass report. The topic of travel restrictions was discussed, not only in the context of L.D. 428, but also in the context of the Dirigo Health Plan. As a result of what we implemented last session, the Dirigo Plan will allow managed care plans to apply to the Superintendent of Insurance for permission to offer health plans with financial incentives to encourage the use of designated providers for specialty and hospital care if the plan does not exceed the Bureau of Insurance rule, Chapter 850, travel standards. As required by the Dirigo Plan law, the Bureau of Insurance is required to prepare rules, which are major substantive in nature, which would be reviewed by the Insurance and Financial Services Committee in this legislature later on in this session. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Turner.

Senator **TURNER**: Thank you, Madame President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. It is my understanding that the Dirigo Board did secure the services of a consultant to look at this matter. That is my understanding and perhaps the chair of the Insurance and Financial Services Committee has that report and can comment on the findings of the consultant.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator LaFountain.

Senator **LAFOUNTAIN**: Thank you, Madame President. I am not in possession of what the Dirigo Board has discussed in reference to this issue. However, it is the Bureau of Insurance, the Superintendent specifically, who will be drafting the rules that will be coming before this legislature.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Turner, requests unanimous consent of the Senate to address the Senate a third time on this matter. Hearing no objection, the Senator may proceed.

Senator **TURNER**: Thank you, Madame President. I think, as many of you may know, Rule 850 requires you to deal with the matter within one hour or fifty miles. The proposition that has been considered by the board through the consultant retained was to double that, in theory, from one hour to two hours and from fifty miles to one hundred miles. It is my contention, because of how our population is centered, that much of the highest quality, lower cost health care, in fact, resides, for many people, beyond those boundaries. I don't think it is unreasonable for us to expect that we should have people traveling where the quality can, in fact, be higher and the cost lower. We should not be setting up arbitrary boundaries of time and distance for that purpose when, in reality, what we are trying to do is lower costs. I think those of you who have studied this matter invariably conclude, as do others, that typically quality and cost run inverse proportions. The more frequently you do a procedure, the higher the quality and you are able to do it at a lower cost. I think Rule 850 runs counter to what we are trying to do with respect to Dirigo. Again, I would ask you to consider not accepting the motion before us from the Senator from York, Senator LaFountain. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Douglass.

Senator **DOUGLASS**: Thank you, Madame President, women and men of the Senate. I rise in support of the pending motion. We are a large geographic state. Rule 850 was established to protect people who are sick from having to go great distances for their health care. Because of costs, some change in that policy may be recommended at this time. It is preferable to have the Dirigo Health Board make those decisions rather than simply erase a rule that was put in force for very good reasons, to protect the citizens of the state who are not healthy and who do have to travel already some distance for their health care. I urge you to support the current motion.

On motion by Senator LAFOUNTAIN of York, the Majority OUGHT NOT TO PASS Report ACCEPTED.

Senator **TURNER** of Cumberland moved the Senate **RECONSIDER** whereby it **ACCEPTED** the Majority **OUGHT NOT TO PASS** Report.

now requires Maine physicians and hospitals to provide a list of all charges to consumers, likewise provides for the Maine Health Data Organization to provide an annual report, listing the ten most frequently used inpatient and out-patient services, and also requiring the Maine Quality Forum to develop quality measures and standards.
