JOINT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY

WHEREAS, January 16, 2023 marks the national and state holiday in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., commemorating his birth on January 15, 1929; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a Baptist minister who advocated the furtherance of civil and human rights for all Americans through nonviolence; and

WHEREAS, this man of great spirit showed this country a dream of "an oasis of freedom and justice"; and

WHEREAS, Dr. King, a model of an American patriot, provided the nation with one of the most prophetic and influential voices in our history: and

WHEREAS, for his tireless work to ensure equality and justice, Dr. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, a high and honorable distinction, in 1964; and

WHEREAS, his eloquence, his perseverance and his faith moved mountains and brought about landmark legal and social changes by appealing to the better instincts and consciences of his fellow human beings; and

WHEREAS, the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., which ended so tragically on April 4, 1968, is a shining example to Americans and citizens of the world at large of uncompromising dedication to the highest ideals; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Gerald Talbot of Portland submitted legislation in 1975 to create a day commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. prior to the federal legislation creating the holiday; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to acknowledge the extraordinary life and works of this teacher, reformer and humanitarian, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and pause in our deliberations to recognize and commemorate the occasion of his birth.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Hickman.

Senator **HICKMAN**: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, women and men of the Senate, I rise to honor the extraordinary life of the late, great Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. To celebrate his birthday and lift up his legacy, I will read brief excerpts from his letter from a Birmingham jail and disperse with the closing passages of his speech entitled 'The Other America' which he delivered at Stanford University on April 14, 1967, just shy of one year before his assassination, and so I quote:

'I have no despair about the future. I have no fear about the outcome of our struggle in Birmingham, even if our motives are presently misunderstood. We will reach the goal of freedom in Birmingham and all over the nation, because the goal of America is freedom. Abused and scorned though we may be, our destiny is tied up with the destiny of America. Before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth, we were here. Before the pen of Jefferson scratched across the pages of history the majestic word of the Declaration of Independence, we were here. For more than two centuries our foreparents labored here without wages; they made cotton king; and they built the homes of their masters in the midst of brutal injustice and shameful humiliation and vet out of a bottomless vitality our people continue to thrive and develop and I say if the inexpressible cruelties of slavery could not stop us, the opposition we now face will surely fail. We're going to win our freedom because both the sacred heritage of our nation and the eternal will of the Almighty God are embodied in our echoing demands. And so I wish you had commended Negro demonstrators of Birmingham for their subline courage, their willingness to suffer, and their amazing discipline in the midst of the most inhuman provocations. One day the South will recognize its real heroes.

They will be the will be the James Merediths, courageously and with a maiestic sense of purpose facing leering and hostile mobs and the agonizing loneliness that characterizes the life of the pioneer. They will be old, oppressed, battered Negro women, symbolized in a seventy-two-year-old woman of Montgomery, Alabama, who rose up with a sense of dignity and with her people decided not to ride the segregated buses, and responded to one who inquired about her tiredness with ungrammatical profundity, 'My feets is tired, but my soul is rested.' The real heroes will be young high school and college students, young ministers of the gospel, and a host of their elders courageously and nonviolently sitting in at lunch counters and willingly going to jail for conscience's sake. One day the South will know that when these disinherited children of God sat down at lunch counters they were in reality standing up for the best in the American dream and the most sacred values in our Judeo-Christian heritage. And so I can sing 'We shall overcome.' We shall overcome because the arc of the moral universe is long but it bends towards justice. We shall overcome because Carlyle is right, 'No lie can live forever.' We shall overcome because William Cullen Bryant is right, 'Truth crushed to earth will rise again.' We shall overcome because James Russell Lowell is right, 'Truth forever on the scaffold, wrong forever on the throne. Yet that scaffold sways the future and behind them unknown stands God within the shadows keeping watch above his own.' With his faith, we will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope. With his faith, we will be able to transform the jangling discourse of our nation into a beautiful symphony of brotherhood. With his faith. we will be able to speed up that day when all God's children. black men and white men, Jews and gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and life together as brothers and sisters all over this great nation. That will be the great day. That will be a great tomorrow and in the words of scripture, to speak symbolically, 'That will be the day when the morning stars will sing together and the sons of God will shout for joy.' Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Duson.

Senator **DUSON**: Thank you, Mr. President. Good morning, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. It is still morning. I rise to speak briefly to the Joint Resolution commemorating the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. This holiday is a day of remembrance and a day of reverence, a day of reflection, a day of recommitment, and a day of celebration. If you go to the Senate webpage and you click on Jill Duson the first words you read are: 'A child of the civil rights movement.' That is my story in seven words. The story of a 9-year old witness to the words and courageous actions of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the leaders of the movement. A witness to reports about the Freedom Riders, lunch counter sit-ins, and bus boycotts, and a witness to the adults in my own life who organized and picketed and marched and were roughed up and arrested and released and arrested again in a two year campaign to win court ordered desegregation of our schools in Chester, Pennsylvania. A child of the civil rights movement is my story of being one of the smart Negro kids who were then bussed across town to the white schools and assigned to the back of the fourth grade class and a child who understood that people had put their lives on the line to open up the world for me and my cohort of Black Negro children. At 10-years old we internalized the expectation of the community,

that we would work twice as hard, to jump every hurdle to success, and remember to pay it forward to the next generation and the next. MLK Day is about remembrance and reverence. Fast forward to 2023. I am so very proud to serve the people of Portland and Westbrook. I am humbled by the prospect of working to make a difference here while being my fully joyful Black self. The first but not the last Black female member of the Maine Senate. This year I turn 70 and these days, MLK weekend, is a time for reflection, assessment, and recommitment. Reflection on my effectiveness in collaborating with engaged activists and elected to meet the needs of our communities. Assessment of how it is going with the drum major of justice imperative. And recommitment to do more and better. MLK Day is about reflection and recommitment. And, lastly, please be reminded that MLK Day is a celebration of his birthday. So, I will conclude my comments on a lighter note, with a favorite poem that has come to be a theme for the month of January and each of my 40 winters in Maine. 'One Thousand and Nine Hundred and Sixty-Eight Winters' by Jackie Earley. 'Got up this morning feeling good and Black. Thinking Black thoughts. Did Black things. Played all my Black records and minded my own Black business. Put on my best Black clothes and walked out my Black door and, Lord have mercy, white snow.'
