JOINT RESOLUTION ENDORSING TAIWAN'S PARTICIPATION IN THE WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION

WHEREAS, good health is essential to every citizen of the world, and access to the highest standards of health information and services is necessary to improve public health; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization set forth in the first chapter of its charter the objective of attaining the highest possible level of health for all people; and

WHEREAS, the achievements of Taiwan, the Republic of China, in the field of health are substantial, including having one of the highest life expectancy levels in Asia, having maternal and infant mortality rates comparable to those of western countries, eradicating infectious diseases such as cholera, smallpox and the plague and being the first country in Asia to eradicate polio and provide children with hepatitis B vaccinations; and

WHEREAS, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and its Taiwanese counterpart agencies have enjoyed close collaboration on a wide range of public health issues; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, Taiwan has expressed a willingness to assist financially and technically in international health activities supported by the World Health Organization; and

WHEREAS, recent events regarding the rapid spread of a mysterious virus originating in Asia speak to the dire need for the direct and unobstructed participation in international health forums and programs critical to limiting the spread of various infectious diseases and achieving good world health; and

WHEREAS, the European Parliament called on the World Health Assembly, in Geneva, Switzerland, to accept observer status for Taiwan and on its member states to support the application of Taiwan as an observer to the World Health Organization; and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has authorized the United States Secretary of State to endorse observer status for Taiwan at the World Health Assembly and President George W. Bush and members of his administration have voiced support for Taiwan's participation in the World Health Organization; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-first Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, take this opportunity to commend and support the efforts of Taiwan, the Republic of China, on its application as an observer to the World Health Organization; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to President George W. Bush, Secretary of Health and Human Services Tommy G. Thompson, the Director-General of the World Health Organization, the Director General of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston and the Members of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

Senator **HATCH**: Thank you, Madame President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I just wanted to bring up a few things in regard to this legislation. This is in regards to bad checks that have been passed, at the local level, in regards to registration. Anyone who does that still can ride around with those plates on their vehicle, for an indefinite amount of time, unless someone like my local town manager who went and physically took the plates off the car. I think this is a bad precedent. I know that if the vehicle is licensed with the Secretary of State's Office they rescind the plates. On the local level there isn't a mechanism to do that unless they go to court and the whole nine yards, which is costly and then many times people don't pay. In this it's still the same. It gives them 30 days to make good on the bad checks.

I felt that we needed this legislation, although we don't have the public outcry at this time. Just listening to my town manager talking about going into somebody's driveway and taking plates off, I don't think that is a good thing for anybody to have to do, whether it's a police officer or the town manager. The Secretary of State's Office, who does this on a regular basis, told us the number is fairly small that they have to deal with, but their reaction to this was that they don't want any more work to do, so they would have to put another employee on and they gave us about a \$40,000 note on this bill. I think they can do it within their budget.

I think they can do it and make sure that people know, by sending out a letter, that either they pay this immediately or we will rescind their registration. I think a letter from the Secretary of State's Office is probably all it would take in most cases. When they don't react to the town when they send out notices to them that they have 30 days to make good on the check, I think just a letter from the Secretary of State's Office, in some cases, would do that. So this \$40,000 note, I don't think there is any reason that we have to put another person on. If they are handling some already, they can handle a few more. Thank you very much. I ask for your support.
