Senator **TEPLER:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, Colleagues of the Senate, when you walk into the new Mount Ararat High School gymnasium and look up into the rafters, there are more than a dozen red and blue championship banners that cover the entire wall. But one banner has been missing since the school's founding in 1973. The girls' basketball team has never before brought home the gold ball. That changed in February of this year, when the Mount Ararat Girls Basketball Team won the 2025 Class A Girls Basketball State Championship.

The Eagles finished their season with a stellar 21-2 record, including winning 15 straight matches through the regular season and the playoffs. The Eagles soared this season, dominating their competition as the number one seed. An impressive stat is that these young women for a stretch of games never allowed more than 57 points and outscored their opponents by 15 points a game. They then topped Gray-New Gloucester in the regional finals and secured their spot in the school's first-ever state championship title match at the Augusta Civic Center.

The Eagles commanded the court with their swift and relentless play, thanks to their team focused basketball. In the championship match against Hampden Academy, Julianna Allen posted a double-double with 17 points and 12 boards. Kennedy Lampert and Jenna Jensen contributed seven points apiece. Head Coach Julie Petrie said her team has the best chemistry, they're the dream team.

Madam President, this team is extremely talented, determined, and focused, with exceptional players, managers and coaches. As the proud mother of kids who were once MTA Eagle athletes, I cannot express how incredibly proud I am, along with yourself, Madam President, of these young women and their families and coaches.

I want to take a moment to recognize those who rallied around this team all season long. The sense of community pride in Topsham, Bowdoinham, Bowdoin, and Harpswell was palpable during their playoff run and it reminds us all how important it is to show up for each other on and off the court. We're so proud to welcome you here today and to celebrate this milestone in your school - our school's history.

I am pleased to submit the Single Audit of the State of Maine for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024. The audit was conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; the requirements of the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996; and Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). Our audit complies with 5 MRSA §243 and is also a prerequisite for the receipt of Federal financial assistance. Senator **INGWERSEN:** Thank you, Madam President. This bill seeks to prohibit state agencies from promoting the COVID-19 vaccine to children under 18. While the intent of this bill may be to limit government involvement in health decisions, the implications will be much more far reaching.

This bill will create confusion and distrust among parents and guardians, hindering efforts to increase vaccination rates among children. The Maine CDC will need to focus further efforts and resources then on combating vaccine misinformation and managing potential outbreaks. By limiting the availability of information about a healthcare choice that is proven to reduce COVID infection rates, Maine will likely see an increase in preventable COVID-related illnesses and consequently the increased need for healthcare services, including MaineCare funded services.

Vaccine education and promotion are core functions of the Maine Immunization Program. Reliable, science-based information for vaccines is disseminated through trusted channels like provider offices, Maine CDC and MaineCare websites, agency media campaigns, and professional networking groups. While children under 18 require parental consent to receive vaccinations, trusted messaging from the Maine Immunization Program and our healthcare providers is essential in equipping parents and guardians with accurate information to make informed choices about their children's health. Without this, misinformation will spread, and vaccination rates will decline, reversing the efforts that the department has worked diligently to maintain.

It's for these reasons that I ask you to follow my light and vote Ought Not to Pass on this.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Moore.

Senator **MOORE:** Thank you, Madam President. I rise in opposition of the motion on the floor.

I agree with my colleague in that we do need to get the information out and everyone to be well informed, but to our children under the age of 18, they have no idea of practically what COVID-19 was. So, I really feel that we should not be promoting it in the avenues that the children under the age of 18 would be -- the parents, yes, and the pediatricians' offices and so forth, but not to our children under the age of 18.

polyfluorocarbons that are on cookware and FDA approved. And the word FDA approved is something that I think that comes into a very important factor to where we are in this. This approval bill does not eliminate the prohibition of PFAS-containing cookware, but instead clarifies that cookware containing specific FDA-approved fluoropolymers should not be subject to the overly broad ban that we have now put in place on PFAS. The FDA has long authorized fluoropolymers for food contact use. These materials have been used safely in cookware for decades - and I mean decades. And it is a distinct PFAS compounds that pose an environmental or health concerns of fluoropolymers are not -- this is not the product that creates that. Stable and durable, they do not degrade under normal use or at the end of their lifecycle. So, when you throw the pot or the pan away, it's not something that runs off and gets into the ground. Nonwater soluble, non-bio cumulative. Unlike other PFAS, they do not break down into harmful byproducts in the environment. Essentially, for performance and safety, they provide nonstick surfaces that reduce the need for cooking oils and making food preparation safer and healthier.

This bill just simply says at the end of the day that it doesn't put Maine on an island, that all of the stores and so forth throughout the state can continue to sell cookware that has this on it, and I think it's very important. Because, you know, we talk about healthy foods and everything else, this does not affect the environment and this keeps -- doesn't put Maine further out on the island and keep moving us further out to sea. And I think it's important because if they can't buy it here, they're going to buy it online or they're going to buy it across the border, because we're beginning again to be one of the only states. Because they're going to continue to buy it and you can bring it into the state, there's nothing illegal about bringing it into the state, so you just can't sell it in the state.

So, I think it's very important that we vote down the pending motion and pass the bill and give these people the ability to continue to sell safe and honest cookware in the State of Maine.

Thank you, Madam President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair would recognize the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Tepler.

Senator **TEPLER:** Thank you, Madam Chair, and I respectfully disagree with my colleague, the Good Senator from Turner, and I want to say that in the matter of PFAS, Maine is a leader. Dirigo. We truly are out ahead of the rest of the nation in understanding the dangers of these substances. We've had more experience with farmlands and other -- and water sources being contaminated, recognizing that level of contamination, and dealing with it. We also know that when it comes to this polymer-coated cookware, when it's heated to 400 degrees or higher, which would normally be a temperature you might use to fry something in a pan, it will break down into PFAS substances that are dangerous. Now, that is not perhaps normal use according to the guidelines of by which you get with these pans, they say don't use them with high heat. Well, don't use them with high heat because they do break down into PFAS.

So, do we really want our children eating their morning eggs cooked on a substance that's broken down into PFAS? I don't think so. And I believe that the rest of the nation will eventually catch up to the State of Maine and that we should continue to move forward in banning a variety of PFAS containing substances.

Thank you, Madam President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Timberlake.

Senator **TIMBERLAKE:** Thank you, Madam President. The Good Senator and I obviously agree to disagree. I don't think the FDA would approve something, I don't think that moving Maine further out on an island is protecting any kids because it doesn't stop the product from coming into Maine, the only thing it does is prevent our businesses in the State of Maine from being able to sell the product.

So, all we do in the State of Maine when we start passing this stuff that puts us on the island and totally different is punish our businesses that are already suffering in this state every single day. Now, we can pretend that isn't happening and we can pretend that we're protecting the world, but we ain't protecting a darn thing except driving our businesses in the state of Maine out of business.

We can continue down the road -- now, I don't expect I'm going to win this debate here today, but I'm going to make it perfectly clear that what we're doing is hurting the businesses that are living and trying to make their living in the State of Maine, trying to pay their taxes, and trying to do those things, and all we continue to do is to continue to make it more and more and more difficult for them, till they say the heck with it. We have -- we are one of the number one states at closing down businesses in the country. Keep it up, folks, we ain't gonna have any left.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Nangle.

Senator **NANGLE:** Thank you, Madam President. I'd like to read something that's written in a study and published on PubMed, which is a peer reviewed repository.

It says at normal cooking temperatures, PTFE-coated cookware releases very gasses and chemicals that present mild to severe toxicity. Only a few studies describe the toxicity of PTFE but without solid conclusions. So, it does release gasses and chemicals that present mild to severe toxicity. In fact, Teflon pans are, if you do cook with them at a normal temperature that you would cook with, move all your -- if you have a pet bird, move it out of the room because the gasses emitted by that Teflon pan will kill it.

And I'd also like to pose a question through the Chair?

THE PRESIDENT: The Member may proceed.

Senator **NANGLE:** Are there alternatives to Teflon-coated pans? I mean, I assume there are, there are lots of pans out there that are not coated with Teflon. In fact, the manufacturers -- I think the manufacturers have moved away from Teflon themselves, and I'm wondering if anyone can confirm or deny that.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Tepler.

Senator **TEPLER:** Thank you, Madam Chair, and I wish to respond by saying yes. If nothing else, there's the very inexpensive alternative of cast iron, which when well-seasoned works extremely well as a nonstick surface. And there are also ceramic-coated cookware that are safe and don't release PFAS

chemicals.

I also am holding the folder for all --

THE PRESIDENT: The Member will defer. The Chair would remind Members that we are not allowed to use props.

Senator **TEPLER:** I'm sorry. I have at hand the folder that contains all of the testimony that was given at the hearing on this bill, and there were no businesses that testified against this bill with the exceptions of the manufacturers of this cookware. No small businesses that sell this cookware testified against the bill.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Bickford.

Senator **BICKFORD:** Thank you, Madam President. May I pose a question through the Chair?

THE PRESIDENT: The Member may proceed.

Senator **BICKFORD:** Thank you. We use at home polymer-coated cookware, and on a sidenote, my wife worships me, so when I get home real late at night, occasionally she leaves me a burnt offering. Should I be concerned?

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Duson, in response to the question.

Senator **DUSON:** Thank you, Madam President. I think the correct reference to that menu item is Cajun blackened.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Ingwersen.

Senator **INGWERSEN:** Thank you. If you're going to talk about PFAS, Madam Chair, I've got to stand up and say something.

So, LD 1537 which we passed last year is currently just finishing up the rulemaking process by the environment department. And it phases out PFAS over a number of years, starting next year, and that was a two-year process that the Good Senator from Androscoggin, her committee went through and it came out of committee, I think it was a unanimous report, and they took a long time to figure out which products to phase in. There's also exemptions allowed. And the bill is designed, the rule is designed so that the most -- products most likely to come in contact with humans are phased out first and that that was where cookware has come in right at the beginning. Not once during that two-year process has the cookware industry come forward and made any suggestions on the bill or entered any data.

I also want to mention that we are a leader in banning PFAS and phasing out PFAS and addressing PFAS contamination in this state, and I'm proud of that. But we are not alone, there are several other states that also ban PFAS in cookware, including Colorado, Minnesota, Connecticut, Vermont, and Rhode Island. New Jersey and California require labeling of PFAS in cookware, and several bills have also been introduced this year in states that ban the use of PFAS in cookware, including Illinois, Maryland, Oregon, and Iowa. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Libby.

Senator **LIBBY:** Thank you, Madam President, Men and Women of the Senate. I don't really have either way a huge opinion on this bill. I mean, I'll be voting against the pending motion, but one of the things that concerns me is - and don't take this wrong, it's not a criticism - but something I think we're -- are we, you know, Congress? We're not Congress. And the problem here is that there are other products that are on the market that we've done nothing about, and we're just picking off these individual bans. That's no way to handle it.

Let me just give you an example. Popcorn that is put in a microwave is in a bag that has PFAS. Did you know that? It's well known. Where's -- do we have an amendment for this bill that -- are we going to tag that on? These individual bans are the wrong way to legislate. That's all I'm saying, nothing personal, I think, you know, the committee did a great job examining the science, no criticism intended at all. Thank you to the committee, thank you to the people who are defending the market, but in some of these PFAS cases, we have to take a broader look at this as a state and we also have to depend on the federal government to help us do that. And, you know, with -- absent that, we're going to be looking at a half a million different products that we might want to ban. I mean, how are we going to do that? That's just not the -- I don't think it's a very -- honestly, I don't think it's the intelligent way to legislate. Thank you very much.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Bennett.

Senator **BENNETT:** Fellow Members of the Senate, I think the Senator from York, Senator Libby - maybe it's Cumberland now, he used to be the Senator from York, sorry - the Senator from Cumberland, I just want to refer to the history of how we got here and why is it that we've got a measure in front of us for an individual ban. Because I agree with his premise, which is where this Legislature started four years ago when we -- one of the very first states in the nation to take the responsibility of looking at PFAS in our environment overall, whether it's in our sofas, whether it's in our sludge, whether it's in our drinking water, whether it's in our cookware. And we did an overall ban. And since then, it's been a history of erosion as the industry and particularly the chemical manufacturers have come back into this state time and again with these little bills to try to undo that good work that we did then.

So, last year, as the Senator from -- actually, the Senator from York, Senator Ingwersen, stated, there was a recognition of the fact that maybe we should review some of this and do it in a different path and an orderly fashion, and that's what LD 1837 did last year. So, the reason that we're here with a small little bill related to polymer-coated cookware is because, in fact, it is the chemical industry that is asking us to roll back bit by bit, item by item, cookware by cookware every product off from that list. And this is the effort that we've been witness to, and I think today, it's time to stand up against that energy and reaffirm the position of this state, which is you've got a product with PFAS, you need to prove why it should exist, not the reverse.

And so, I will be voting for the Ought Not to Pass Report, Madam President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair would recognize the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Cyrway.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President. I just want to make sure we don't lose our popcorn, my wife really like it, and I just want to --.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Ingwersen.

Senator **INGWERSEN:** Madam President, I would happily like to inform this Body that we have banned PFAS in food packaging, including popcorn bags, in 2019. So, you can happily eat your popcorn and hopefully, if the laws are being followed, there will be no PFAS in that popcorn. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Tepler.

Senator **TEPLER:** Thank you. I very much like to thank the Good Senator from Oxford, Senator Bennett, for his words because I completely agree with him. The choice of what to ban and what order it will be taken up in is not being made by this Legislature at this time. It is being made by the Department of Environmental Protection and they are making it with as much scientific thoughtfulness as is possible.

This particular carveout comes from the Good Senator from Turner's bill. It does not come from a previous bill that instated a ban on this particular substance.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass report. A roll call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?
