RABBI LISA VINIKOOR: Good morning. Thank you to Senator Tepler for inviting me here this morning and to Senate President Daughtry as well for welcoming me.

Today is Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day. A day when Jews across the world pause in grief and remembrance of the tragedy of the Holocaust. And it is also a day when we pause to remember all of the righteous and brave people who stood up, with great courage, to combat bigotry, antisemitism, and hate.

And so, I want to bring you a little teaching and prayer on this theme of courage based on an ancient Jewish teaching that describes how the Israelites passed from slavery into freedom. According to the story, when Pharaoh finally let the Israelites go, the Israelites moved as fast as they could to escape. And yet, as they journeyed out of Egypt, they came upon a great ocean, a great sea call the Sea of Reeds, and they were trapped. Behind them was Pharaoh's army and in front of them, a seemingly impassable body of water. As they stood together at the edge of the sea, there was panic and chaos, anxiety and fear. Some started to complain, asking their leader, Moses, why did you bring us out of slavery only to die? Others were fighting about what to do. Maybe they should turn back or try to swim. But as the story goes, in that moment, with all of the strife and fighting, a simple person named Nachshon decided he had to do something. And so, he took one simple step, carefully into the sea, and he kept on walking forward step by step. And amazingly, as he walked, going deeper and deeper into the water, his fellow Israelites stopped arguing and they followed him. And then, when they were all together, walking forward into the water, then the sea parted, with two walls of water on each side and dry ground in the middle, so that the Israelites could cross through the water safely to freedom on the other side.

We, too, are like Nachshon and the Israelites. We face discontent about the present, deep uncertainty about the future. At times, it can feel like the problems in our communities are intractable. But Nachshon comes to remind us that each of us is capable of quieting the noise around us to make a positive difference if only by taking just one small step forward. On this day and in the days and weeks ahead, may you, the Senators and leaders of our great state, be blessed with the courage of Nachshon. May you be blessed like him to think outside of the box, may you be blessed with the willingness to take a risk, to bring more healing and wholeness to our communities and our state. May God bless you with courage, conviction, understanding, and with peace. Amen.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from
Cumberland, Senator Talbot Ross.

Senator **TALBOT ROSS:** Thank you so very much, Madam
President. Today, it is an honor to recognize the dedicated state
staff from the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and
Forestry, Maine Forest Service who have deployed out of state in
2024.

Through regional and national mutual aid agreements, the
Maine Forest Service partners with state and federal agencies to
protect our natural resources through the Northeast Forest Fire
Protection Compact and the National Stafford Act Master
Agreement. We share resources across state lines, providing
and receiving assistance as needed. Our Maine Forest Rangers
and forest service staff receive extensive training in wildfire and
natural disaster response and they continue to build their
expertise through nationwide deployments. The Maine Forest
Service team takes pride in their collaborative approach to
emergency response, providing support locally and nationwide.

While wildfire suppression involves inherent risks, a
successful mission is built on the state's robust infrastructure
which includes aviation programs, a fleet of specialized engines,
modern facilities, wildfire preparedness initiatives, and skilled
response teams including dedicated volunteers throughout Maine.
We thank the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and
Forestry's Commissioner Amanda Beal, and I'd like to just give a
special thanks to Emily Horton who is the Director of Policy and
Community Engagement in the DACF, for all of their work in

making sure that we were able to recognize -- and I will point out to this Body this is the first time that we have been able to recognize the Maine Forest Service, that we recognize them today.

Joining us today is the Chief Forest Ranger, Robby Gross, the Maine Forest Service Director, Patty Cormier, and the brave men and women of the Maine Forest Service. If you would grant me some indulgence here, because I always think it's important in these recognize to not just gloss over the individuals who are actually risking their lives, they're providing really important service to the state and to this country, it's important to hear their names and to be intentional about our recognition. So, with some indulgence, I'd like to just say the names of those individuals and to show the Senate and the State of Maine that these are folks who come from all across our great state. With your indulgence.

These fine brave men and women from the Maine Forest Service join us today, and it is my honor and privilege to be able to recognize them for their trip to the state and for all of every day, for everything they are doing for our state, we are truly, truly indebted, and we honor you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair would recognize the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Cyrway.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I just wanted to speak for a moment.

I was a Deputy Sheriff for 25 years and also I've been on the fire protection -- Firefighters Protection Commission, and work closely with several of these officers and very proud of them. It was interesting because, you know, me as being the DARE juvenile officer for Kennebec County at that time, I actually got to have my little office in the substation at the Benton Forest Service, and I would add my -- so, I got to experience how they work and how they get around and how they get along together and it's really a close-knit family. And they're outdoorsmen, they really enjoy the outdoors, and the women and men alike, they all kind of get along great and they work together well, they are constantly training each other and keeping up with their

equipment. I mean, that's a really important piece. Their pumps, making sure that those are working. I know one time we had a situation where a train was -- the spark arrest was failing on the train and it was lighting fires along the tracks and there was, I think, 11+ fires from Clinton up through to Newport and went up through Bingham. And I went there to help them as well and we really all worked good together.

There were many times I got calls from Lisa Meyers, actually, to go out in the woods with her in situations where it could've been very dangerous, on line disagreements, and also where illegal cuttings were happening, and they were not the safest situations. I know Scott Maddox, he's -- I'm very proud of him, he's gone up the ranks, done very well for himself, and I can remember when he first started, Joe Pelletier used to tease him a lot, and he -- he started wondering about Joe, but then he got along and he's really grown through the years and just proud of all of them. I know they take off and go to other states and they do some jumping out of helicopters and they've got training teams that they go on the ground and fight these fires and it's just amazing.

Also, you know, just the improvements that we've done. One is that they're allowed to carry guns now. I mean, I can't imagine doing their job without having a firearm with them, especially with rabid animals or with some of the characters they come up with and whatever, you know, I think it was the best thing that we could've done for them.

So, I thank you, but the one major thing that I wanted to get across to you is that in law enforcement, we are all a brother, we're all brothers and sisters. And it doesn't matter if they're here, if they're in another state, I -- you know, I was very much involved in national conferences and talking to -- and working with other officers all over the country, and I'll tell you that we have to be all working together. We cannot be apart. When I see bills come across our aisle, saying that we should separate and not do something with a federal agency, that is wrong. When you do that, then guess what? It's like me saying I'm not going to come out and take care of your fire over there and then expect them to come and take care of ours. It doesn't work that way.

So, I just wanted to make sure that everybody understands in the law enforcement world, we are a brotherhood, and we take care of each other. And so, that's the important piece here, and thank you, Madam President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Franklin, Senator Black.

Senator **BLACK:** Thank you, Madam President, Men and Women of the Senate. I rise today to recognize extraordinary dedication of the Maine Forest Service and their partners, who not only served with distinction throughout the 2024 mobilization season, but have already been called into action this year.

In 2024, our Forest Rangers and the short-haul teams responded to 25 emergencies across the country. They deployed 30 times to places like California, New Mexico, Georgia, North Carolina after Hurricane Helene, and many other places. They brought their skills, their courage, and their compassion to the communities in crisis. That included 41 Rangers, one Forester, one entomologist, staff from the Land Use Planning Commission, and 24 call-when-needed firefighters. They just didn't go, they made a difference, and they came home safe. Their work also strengthened Maine's ability to respond to emergencies right here at home.

Just a few months ago in 2025, they only -- within a few months of 2025, they've already been mobilized again to California, where they helped battle the devastating fires, once again they were called, answered the call without hesitation. And I can't imagine putting on all the protective gear they have and I was talking to a couple of them this morning, and, you know, they were fighting fires when it was over 100 degrees, and with that protective gear and long days and say nothing about the danger that they were in all the time, wind changed and all kinds of things that put their lives in jeopardy. And they went to work without hesitation.

Their service is a reminder of how strong mutual aid networks can be. When disaster strikes, we give help, and we also receive it. That's the kind of cooperation that's essential. It saves lives. So, today, let us express our deepest thanks to those men and women for their service, their sacrifice, and the pride that they bring to the State of Maine. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Hickman.

Senator **HICKMAN:** Thank you, Madam President, Women and Men of the Senate. I thank the Good Senator from Cumberland, the Senate Chair of the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee, Senator Talbot Ross, for reading the names of the men and women that we are here recognizing today. I'll add a few more to the list.

Recently retired Chief Forest Ranger pilot John Crowley and Jeff Currier became two of my best friends through their relentless advocacy to ensure their Forest Rangers had all the tools they needed to do their jobs and ensure they could come home safely to their families at the end of a workday. And as the Other Good Senator from Kennebec mentioned, that meant that the Legislature had to do the right thing and pass the bill to allow them to carry firearms. And so, I stand and I honor the work of the whole Maine Forest Service team, but especially the Forest Rangers, those certified law enforcement officers and the work they perform on behalf of the people of the great state of Maine. It often goes unheralded. Unsung heroes, to be sure, their dedication and commitment to protecting life and property remains unparalleled. Whether it be fighting fires as we've heard about already, enforcing the laws against timber theft, and rescuing people from precarious situations through their short-haul rescue efforts, and much more, they are truly inspiring.

And so I am honored to be here today in the Maine Senate. It's serendipitous, I suppose, to recognize these brave souls for the first time in our official proceedings. I want to thank the leadership of the Department and thank all of the men and women who do this work, putting your lives on the line every day for us. It does not go unnoticed. Thank you.
