Senator **HICKMAN:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, Women and Men of the Senate, good morning. I rise with pride to recognize and congratulate the Maranacook Community High School Boys Alpine Ski Team for winning the Class B State Championship this past winter.

These skiers shredded down Saddleback Mountain on a snowy day in late February in two events, the slalom, and the giant slalom. The difference between these, as the boys explained to me this morning, is about speed and turns. Slalom is more technical and features tight turns. Giant slalom, on the other hand is, as it sounds, bigger, with wider and faster turns. I think the gates might be bigger, too.

The championship was the Black Bears' first in five years and their ninth under Coach Ron Gifford's leadership. Over the course of 24 clean runs down the mountain, the Maranacook boys scored 1552 points, beating out Central Aroostook and Cape Elizabeth. Maranacook boasted the giant slalom champion and slalom runner-up, Thatcher Riley. The team placed two more skiers in the top ten, Tristan Riley, fourth, and Adam Ellis tied for eighth. And two others in the top 30, Josh Adam, 15th, and Sam Hayes, 28th. In the giant slalom, Tristan Reilly placed fifth, Adam Ellis finished tenth, and Josh Adam came in 11th.

The team is coached by Ron Gifford, a member of the Maine Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame. He is ably assisted by coaches John Whitney, Lindsay Duca, and Andrew Dupuis.

I am glad that the team was able to get out on the slopes and make the most of the coldest and snowiest winter we've had in Maine in a few years, and I wish the seniors we have joining us today all the best in their future endeavors, in snow and sun, school and career. And to those of you who will be returning as Black Bears next year, I hope for the return of a winter wonderland, and for the fastest runs between those gates.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, I rise today in opposition to the motion to accept the Minority Report.

If your child drew on the wall with a crayon, would you let him or her keep using it? If we accept the Minority Report, we essentially answer yes to this question, but with many more dangerous repercussions. Strongly, both the Maine Sheriff's Association and the Maine Chiefs of Police Association oppose this bill. In testimony to the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety, Chief Jason Moen, President of the Maine Chiefs Association, noted drug traffickers may use their vehicles to transport drugs to other states or within a community. The sale of the illegal drugs many times occurs in the vehicle used by the trafficker. Traffickers depend on their vehicles and their ability to drive them to conduct illegal activities.

Madam President, we should ensure judges to have the tools they need to combat these dangerous behaviors. One important

way of holding - my fingers are a little - traffickers accountable in the suspension of a driver's license. A driver's license is not a right, it's a privilege. While proponents of repealing the ability for a judge to suspend a drug trafficker's driver's license might argue that it inhibits them from getting a job, they forget that the judge has access to the facts of the case and would be able to understand how the penalty of the driver's license suspension would impact the defendant. If LD 421 were to pass, then the court system would lose the ability to hear a case, ascertain the public safety could be at risk if the defendant was allowed to drive and be unable to invoke a license suspension.

We cannot enact justice and help traffickers change their behavior for the better if we do not hold them accountable for their actions and take away the means they use to traffic drugs. Just like your child might continue coloring on the walls right after you say don't, if you never remove the crayon from his or her hand. So, ask if your neighbor was using his or her car to traffic drugs, should he or she still have a driver's license?

I urge you all to reject the motion and move on to accept the bipartisan majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair defers and recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Curry.

Senator **CURRY:** Thank you, Madam President. I did not plan to speak on this today, so I will do this from memory and from a position of passion.

I support the motion before us because it is of critical state interest for people who have served their sentence to be able to rejoin society and find a path that is different than the one before. Being without a vehicle prevents anyone from reentry and it traps people into all sorts of horrible situations in this state. We simply do not have the public transportation available for people to engage in society, to return to society. There must be pathways back for people to join community again. And this is -- while this is a rarely used -- currently, it's a rarely used tactic from -- strategy from some judges, you know, we don't know what might change. And certainly, having judges decide that we're going to indefinitely prevent people from rejoining society, I have a great, great concern with. I think the metaphor is not the crayon that's being taken away, but food. If a child is throwing food, you don't prevent them from having food in the future.

We have a system where the penalty is vetted out and people have served their sentence; they've served their sentence. It is now time to support them. It is in all of our interests to support people to rejoin society in productive ways, and this only hampers that and more likely increases the revolving door of our justice system and more likely throws lives away and more likely costs society. And for that reason, I am passionately in support of the pending motion.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Cyrway.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President. I just wanted to remind the Body that they have not served their sentence if -- and because this is part of the sentence. The license suspension provision is part of the sentence. So, they have not served their sentence until that is taken care of.

I just want to make sure that you are all aware of exactly why there is opposition to a bill that yes, we want to bring physicians, physician's assistants, other providers in, we want that, but that is what we do; strike, replace, strike, replace. Let's make sure that the people that come in and support these things know when we're striking and replacing the bills that we're working on.

Senator **GUERIN:** Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Currently, the law requires all vehicle owners to carry insurance as proof that they can cover any costs in the event of an accident. That's good, I like that, I'm sure you do, too. However, for some religious organizations, traditional insurance goes against their beliefs. This bill offers a way for them to meet the law's requirements while respecting their faith. This bill provides a clear process for religious organizations to prove they can responsibly self-insure. The organizations would need to show they are financially stable and that they've been meeting their obligations for the past two years. This ensures that only groups with the ability to handle self-insurance would be able to take part.

The bill also makes sure that these organizations will still have the financial means to cover any possible costs, with the requirement of a letter of credit or a deposit to back them up. This gives everyone confidence that the financial responsibility is still there, just like traditional insurance.

For many smaller religious groups, this option would be more affordable and a simpler way to comply with the law without going through the complicated and expensive process of buying commercial insurance. This flexibility is important for organizations that may not fit into the standard insurance model but still need to make sure they're following the rules. While this bill gives religious organizations the ability to self-insure, it also ensures that public safety isn't compromised. If an organization stops meeting the financial requirements, the State can step in and revoke their self-insurance certificate. This will keep things in check to make sure everyone on the road is covered. And this option has been used by several other states.

I encourage you to support this bill as it strikes an acceptable balance between constitutionally protected religious freedom and ensuring the safety of all drivers. Thank you for your time and consideration.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Bailey.

Senator **BAILEY:** Thank you, Madam President. As the Good Senator from Penobscot indicated, this bill is an attempt to address the dilemma of Mainers who have religious objections to the purchase of insurance but who are still subject to the State's financial responsibility insurance laws.

All drivers and vehicle owners in the state of Maine are subject to these financial responsibility laws in Title 29, and then we all meet these requirements by purchasing and maintaining car insurance. Although LD 918 does not amend the insurance code, it does allow organizations to conduct insurance-like activities without insurance regulations. Similar bills have been introduced in the last two sessions and a stakeholder group met after the last session, including the Bureau of Insurance and the Secretary of State. Unfortunately, there was no solution reached that was acceptable to all parties. The conclusion was that a person sustaining personal injury or property damages in an

accident where someone covered by this type of exemption would have significantly fewer protections as compared to the same accident with a person covered by traditional insurance.

Under this bill, there are no formal claims processing, no adjuster to assess damages and work with medical providers and body shops to arrange payment, and no dispute resolution process except to file a lawsuit. Unlike insurers, these organizations would not be subject to the rigorous solvency requirements and the amount required to be deposited with the State Treasurer as an assurance that claims will be paid is \$250,000 for up to ten vehicles. That is very low by -- as by law, an insurance policy must cover at least \$125,000 in liability for just one vehicle in an accident.

Ultimately, the Secretary of State testified they have neither the resources nor the ability to evaluate financial fitness and no administrative confidence in insurance. They testified that through the stakeholder group, they thoughtfully and thoroughly studied the feasibility of allowing such an exemption and concluded that the detriment to the public at large was unacceptable. I would also note that it's my understanding that the organization that brought this forward and has brought this forward is exploring other avenues, including setting up some sort of corporation that could purchase the insurance for them. So, I think that they are going to be able to find a solution.

So, I ask you to follow my light and vote along with the majority of the committee. Thank you.

This bill is an overreach by us, the State, on hiring practices, and it's especially tough on small employers who don't have the human resources departments that larger companies do have. Moreover, it considers only pay ranges that may be available, but there's much more to pay that factor in the hiring decisions. Such things as education, experience, availability and flexibility - they're also vital, especially in today's workforce environment that is dynamic as -- than it's ever been in the past, much more dynamic. Flexibility on the parts of the employer and the employee are absolutely necessary in determining the compatibility of the eventual work relationship. This one size fits all proposal will impede that, to the detriment of both the employer and the employee, so I urge you to vote no on this bill -- motion. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Bickford.

Senator **BICKFORD:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, in my time managing businesses throughout central and southern Maine, I had anywhere from 20 to over 100 employees. I had some that were superstars. They would come in no matter what time of day or night, I would call, need somebody to come in, they would come in. Those people, I would pay much more than I would pay the ones that could never come in when I called them, would call out occasionally and weren't dependable, didn't do their job as well as the others. Whose business is it what I pay my employees? Nobody's. I have a confidentiality agreement with my employees. That is what I pay you is nobody's business, and if you do tell someone, you could lose your job. Because of the condition that happens when people know what each other makes. Now, I had a brother that worked at BIW 40+ years. You know what? They all made the same amount of money. It didn't matter if you were a superstar or not. That's not a good way to manage a business. You want your superstars to be paid.

Thank you, Madam President.

Senator **TIPPING:** Thank you, Madam President. I would like to clarify a couple of items here.

First of all, this bill exempts small employers. It also simply requires that pay ranges be included in job ads, and that's a very broad definition of what that can be, it can be any applicable pay scale, a previously determined range of wages for the position, the actual range of wages for those currently holding equivalent positions or the budgeted amount for the position. And this is important for a couple of reasons. First of all, there have been some pay discrimination cases that this information could've helped with and prevented, and also this is important for our workforce, where people can choose the careers and the jobs that best fit them and best fit the needs of our state. So, I believe putting this information out there is very important.

I would also note that a confidentiality agreement that

prohibits employees from speaking with each other about their wages would be against federal law. Thank you.

She's growing up and having a job has been a huge part of her life already. She's actually learned the value of a dollar, which I'm very thankful for.

This bill is good for many other young Mainers as well. Earlier this -- the earlier they learn these lessons, the better. There's another bill coming up, and I'm going to speak on the other one. I'll speak briefly about something that might relate to that, with your permission.

nothing -- when they're only abiding by the existing law.

So, I would remind my fellow colleagues that every single immigrant, legal or whatever stripe, is a noncitizen here. So, you're basically having this law apply to legal immigrants who come to Maine, or anyplace in the United States. And I think that that would be a sad day in this country.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass report. A roll call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair now recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Carney.

Senator **CARNEY:** Thank you very much, Madam President. I rise to speak to provide a little information about this bill, because it's something that the Judiciary Committee spent a lot of time and thoughtful energy on. We had a public hearing, of course, and

then we held two work sessions, and we did that so that we could do a deep dive into the data. We wanted to know what does the representation of prosecutors to population look like based on the population in each prosecutorial district, and we also wanted to know if there were other similarly situated prosecutorial districts and counties that might want to separate into multiple districts just like the request that was made in this legislation with regard to prosecutorial district seven, which includes Hancock and Washington Counties.

So, currently, the prosecutorial districts, the judicial districts, and our newly formed public defender districts all mirror each other. So, a change to one could lead both to changes in other districts and then to changes that would impact the Judicial Branch and the public defender offices. Our concern was both short- and long-term operational and fiscal impacts of allowing this one prosecutorial district to split into additional smaller districts.

We understood the concerns that were raised by Washington County and believe that they are very important concerns to ensure that the prosecutor elected in any district really reflects and represents the needs of the district as a whole. But when we looked at the numbers, this is what we found. So, there are eight prosecutorial districts. We found that the district eight, which is Aroostook County, has actually the greatest representation, one prosecutor for every approximately 9,500 residents. District two, which is Cumberland County, had the least representation, one prosecutor for approximately every 16,000 residents. District seven, the one that is related to this legislation, Hancock and Washington Counties, is kind of in the middle of the pack with one prosecutor for every approximately 12,000 residents. And the other district that seemed kind of comparable to district seven, which is district three, including Oxford, Franklin, and Androscoggin County, was also right in that middle position with about one prosecutor for every 13,000 residents. And district three was similar in that there were predominantly rural counties and predominantly urban - or more urban, let's say - areas such as in district seven. And so, we really struggled with the long-term implications of allowing district seven to split into two separate districts and the impact it would have on, for example, district three, that seemed similar in a lot of ways, and then what does it say for districts that are either over or under-represented with prosecutors.

The other thing we took into account was that by law, a district attorney is entitled to appoint a deputy district attorney in any district. And so, while there wouldn't be numerically, maybe, an addition of another attorney in the newly created district attorney's office, there would be an elevated position of the district attorney plus an elevated position of a deputy district attorney, both of which would have fiscal impacts.

We struggled with this. We definitely understand the concerns brought by the bill's sponsor and the concerns of folks in Washington County and in Hancock County who spoke in support of the legislation, but we thought that the long-term operational and fiscal consequences were too concerning to move forward. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Haggan.

Senator **HAGGAN:** Thank you very much, Madam President - I almost said Chair or whatever -- what have you - and Honorable Members of the Senate. Data is important, and common sense

plus data is more important.

Other districts like district three and whatnot have financial resources that go way beyond Washington County. So, this would create a separate -- would separate Washington County from prosecutorial district seven and create a new prosecutorial district number nine for Washington County effective 2027. The amendment requires an election of the district attorney, of course, and they can do an ADA, as you all know. The amendment, I believe, is extremely important for the people of this area because they have disadvantages in the state of Maine that other counties don't have. They've got incredible poverty compared to the southern counties, they have disadvantages in all of the ways that I think you know that I'm just not going to say right here. It's very reasonable to enact this. It's not a whole lot of money, the fiscal note would be 27,000 for the year '27. Travel is huge. It's a big county, it's half the size of Aroostook County, way over 3,000 square miles. Distance from Eastport to Ellsworth court is -- is a lot, and with the high gas prices and the economic stifling of a lot of the people that live there, this is just a terrifying inconvenience to have to drive all that way to have to get your case adjudicated in court.

So, for me, it is just fair, it's common sense. Give them their own district attorney and allow them to elect a person from there to help adjudicate their cases. That's time immemorial with the way we do our judicial stuff, as it were.

We've spent a lot of money in this building. We've spent a tremendous amount of money. Something like this is critical and important. It's a worthy spending of money to help the people in one of the more disadvantaged areas of the state that we know and love.

So, for me, this is not a difficult issue, it's easy, very easy, and I think we should all make this happen. Thank you very much.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Moore.

Senator **MOORE:** Thank you, Madam President. I stand in opposition to the motion on the floor, and I do appreciate Senator Carney's detailed analysis and all of the thoughtfulness that went into consideration of my bill.

By statute, there are currently eight prosecutorial districts. Since the creation of the districts in 1987, the law has not been changed to reflect population and demographic shifts, unlike the redistricting we see as legislators every ten years, coinciding with the official census.

Washington County covers 3,258 square miles, with a population of 31,379 during the 2020 census, and is currently part of district seven with Hancock County, as mentioned before. In comparison, Hancock County is 2,345 square miles, with a population of 54,987. Washington County's footprint is spread out very similar to Aroostook County, so travel from one end of Washington County to the other could take five hours, let alone traveling from Calais or Danford to the courthouse in Ellsworth, especially in bad weather.

Creating prosecutorial district number nine for Washington County will give the public, counsel, and those involved in court proceedings greater access to justice, without delays and with the full support of all law enforcement personnel in their communities. Someone who lives and works in Washington County is going to better represent their community, putting the needs of their friends and neighbors first, just as we do here in the Legislature.

Cost wise, each county currently pays for buildings and support staff. This would not change under this bill, nor would it stop each county from collaborating with others or even sharing resources with one another. Historically, the Washington County delegation has been asking for our own district attorney since the 129th Legislature, and again in the 130th. Each time, the version of the bill was passed unanimously out of committee. The last version in the 130th was actually adopted by the House and the Senate but was not funded out of the Appropriations Committee.

While the number of pending cases may not be as high as Aroostook County, the citizens of Washington County deserve to have their own district attorney.

Thank you, Madam President.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lawrence.

Senator **LAWRENCE:** Thank you, Madam President, Men and Women of the Senate. I understand the purpose behind this bill, but I cannot support it. All prosecutorial districts face the same challenges. If you look at Penobscot and Piscataquis County, which I believe are in a prosecutorial district together, they are very different. If you look at Androscoggin County and the two counties associated with that, they are very different. And each prosecutor who is elected by the public has to figure out how to meet the needs of those districts.

The prosecutorial districts were created back in 1986. The Senator from -- the prior speaker was correct in when they were created, and they were created through a process that changed the judiciary and the prosecutorial districts at the same time. So, they were both reformed at the same time. And the reason was was to decrease the overhead and the expenses of both the judiciary and the prosecutors in that case and when they did it. To try to undo it in a specific case would be extremely difficult, complicated for the judiciary, complicated for the prosecutors, and is really going in reverse because we used to have county prosecutorial system and that was abandoned in this state and decided on prosecutorial districts. And we really have to stick with that.

The other thing that's going to happen is that because the prosecutors are state employees, they are paid by the State, they are agents of the State. They don't answer to the Attorney General, they don't answer to the Governor; they answer to no one but their voters. But their support staff under this statute must be supplied to be adequate by the county -- by the counties they're involved with. Under this change, Washington County would be exclusively responsible for its support staff now. Here, under the current prosecutorial district, it's shared between Hancock and Washington County based upon what the DA decides. So, a wealthier county like Hancock - no offense to the representative from -- the Senator from Hancock, Senator Grohoski - the wealthier county Hancock subsidizes the court expense, the expert witnesses, everything for Washington County. That would not occur if you split these districts apart.

Going back to that system is not the correct resolution. It needs to be resolved within the prosecutorial district, by the prosecutor, by the DA, who maybe should assign the chief deputy to handle Washington County and the DA handle Hancock County and address the separate needs that way. Thank you.

The President requested the Sergeant-At-Arms escort the Senator from Cumberland, Senator **PIERCE**, to the rostrum where she assumed the duties as President Pro Tem.

The President retired from the Chamber.

The Senate was called to order by President Pro Tem **TERESA PIERCE** of Cumberland County.

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**THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock County, Senator Grohoski.

Senator **GROHOSKI:** Thank you, Madam President. As a senator that represents folks who would be impacted by this legislation, I think it would be appropriate for me to just weigh in.

I am pleased to co-sponsor this legislation, I was thrilled to offer a perspective from Hancock County at the public hearing, and I still do support the legislation. I don't think that unless you are really a neighboring county in the way Hancock and Washington County are you can understand the importance of this legislation. And so, from my perspective, representing Hancock County and having grown up there, I feel a deep obligation to the people of Washington County to set them up with a legal structure that best supports their unique needs. And that might sound obscure, but specifically, there is a significant amount of evidence that firstly, opioid manufacturers targeted doctors despite knowing how addictive opioids were. That's the first fact. Secondly, opioid overprescription in the late 1990s was linked to one doctor in particular in Washington County. And I sent this information to the Judiciary Committee because it is so concerning and horrifying what happened to people in that county that make a living by working hard, you know, on the water, tipping for wreaths, etcetera, these are people that's bodies are beat up by the work they do and they are seeking pain treatment and, unfortunately, they found it in a way that was destructive to the community fabric. And as I said, the crisis took hold and has affected and continues to affect Washington County to this day in a way that I do not believe it is affecting any other county in the state.

So, I just want to share a statement that Representative Nina Milliken of Blue Hill and I sent to the committee after the public hearing on this bill, and it said; We do not think that prosecution is the best way to address substance use disorder, which is a medical diagnosis. We are aware of prosecution models in Maine that have successfully moved folks into treatment and back into community without a criminal record. To our knowledge, the current DA and previous DAs have not taken such an approach, possibly because of limited bandwidth and the incredible backlog of cases in our district. A prosecutor dedicated to Washington County might be more able and interested in focusing on alternative prosecution models in response to the region's unique needs.

So, I just wanted to share that statement and my opinion as a person, like I said, who grew up in Hancock County, whose mother is a school nurse and really has shared a lot with me about those disturbing trends and what they mean for our neighbors farther Downeast. And so, that's why I'm still a strong supporter of this. I appreciate the data. Because this does not add any full-time equivalent type employees, I don't see that it's relevant to look at the ratios county by county. This is really

about how do we set up Washington County to recover from this crisis which was, I believe, foisted upon them by the pharmaceutical industry. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Carney.

Senator **CARNEY:** Thank you, Madam President. I just rise briefly to provide some clarifying information.

I think that there's a confusion about district seven only having one courthouse. That's something that people should not assume. In fact, there's one courthouse for Hancock County, which is in Ellsworth, and then there are two courthouses in Washington County. There's one in Machias and one in Calais.

**THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lawrence.

Senator **LAWRENCE:** Thank you, Madam President. And I apologize for rising to speak again, but I do want to clarify something that was just raised.

Drug prosecution is not the responsibility of the DA's office. The DAs for years have had an agreement with the Attorney General's Office that the Attorney General's Office will do murders, they will do crimes in which the State is a victim, and they will do the drug prosecution through the AG's office. It's done through a federal grant, they work out of the AG's office, and they are supervised by the AG's office. So, I believe there are six, there may be more now, drug prosecutors around the state. So, if there's a problem in Washington County over drug prosecution, it's a problem with the AG's office, not with the DA's office. And therefore, this split of the DA's district will not address that problem, it will in fact create more difficulties in addressing prosecutorial issues. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair now recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Baldacci.

Senator **BALDACCI:** Thank you, Madam President. I just want to briefly discuss this bill, and I understand that there are strong feelings both ways. But this bill -- Maine's statutes already include the provisions that are in this bill as to all other drugs - cocaine, fentanyl, heroin. The bill is to address the gap as it relates to amphetamines and meth. According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, meth taken along with fentanyl is the second leading contributor to the opioid crisis in America. Research from the U.S. Centers of Disease Control and Prevention show that meth is the second most commonly found drug in people who fatally overdose after synthetic lab-made opioids.

People on meth alone or from a combination of it with other drugs and typically in this situation, this is to, frankly, allow prosecutions to go forward on a strengthened basis. I communicated with the assistant attorney general who's in charge of drug -- or the drug taskforce in our state. He indicated that this bill would be helpful to prosecutors, particularly on the meth issue. He felt that the amphetamine thing might -- would not make any difference to them. But on the meth issue, which is contributing to the overall opioid crisis, it would help prosecutors.

Let me just tell you, I come from a community that has three opioid clinics -- opioid treatment clinics. Okay? More than my community wanted or by itself needed. But we have had not only over a thousand people in treatment in Bangor, but we've also had the effects of this opioid crisis in the homeless community, on the streets, in the jails. So, I understand -- and I have been a long proponent as an attorney, as a member of the bar, of alternative sentencing, participated really in some of the first programs that we had in this state for drug courts, for juvenile drug courts, and I believe in those processes, but there has to be balance and there has to be effectiveness and there has to be a strategy that deals with all sides of this problem.

So, I ask you to oppose the pending motion. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Cyrway.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, I rise today to urge this Body to recognize that common sense tells us a drug is a drug. This bill not only recognizes something common sense tells us to be true, but it also brings the law governing amphetamines and methamphetamines into consistency with the definitions of the law governing drugs for fentanyl, cocaine, and heroin. For example, the definition of heroin states that heroin means any compound, mixture, or preparation containing heroin and the -- I guess another word for it is diacetylmorphine in any quantities. In any quantity. The definitions proposed in this bill are amphetamine means any compound, mixture, or a preparation containing amphetamine in any quantity. And methamphetamine

means any compound, mixtures, or preparation containing methamphetamine in any quantity.

As you now are aware, Madam President, the current law uses the same definition for other drugs as the definition we are proposing for amphetamine and methamphetamines, and these definitions are not new. They recognize the fact that these substances are being mixed for use, not for storage or not to go in the garbage. The committee voted in bipartisan manner Ought to Pass on this bill in part due to the fact that all these bills does is make the law consistent.

Please join me and the bipartisan group of legislators who voted Ought to Pass by voting in support of LD 771. Thank you, Madam President.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Curry.

Senator **CURRY:** Thank you, Madam President. I am supporting the pending motion. I support the pending motion because specifically in the text it's like any trace amount of methamphetamine to a mixture, to a combination, changes that entire quantity to methamphetamine. And so, what we're doing here is -- what we're doing here is lowering the standard for what does it mean to be a trafficker. What does it mean to be a trafficker? This Body, I think the principle with -- the principles behind our response has been in the last few years around drug enforcement has been to focus on trafficking and not to focus on those who really have the illness of substance use disorder. We're trying to target our law enforcement towards trafficking and not towards use and those who are experiencing substance use disorder. And this lowers the standard. It lowers the standard because it is quite common for people to cut drugs with other substances that are not - you know, sugars or other things - that are not active to -- to make it go further. And in doing so, we can easily -- we can easily get into criminalizing this trafficking that which is simple possession and possession of those who are most at risk at the -- are most taken over by the -- by the substance use disorder.

And so, I have real concerns about that. I also have a -- just a basic concern to say, you know, to say, you know, if I have, you know, a few grams of meth and I put it into a pound of sugar, I now have a pound and a few grams of meth. That just seems ridiculous and, logically, I have a hard time placing that in statute. And based on that, I think we should continue to be focused on what is the active ingredient that we are seeking to address and pay a lot of attention to that and the amount. And I can -- I can believe the argument if you've got a certain amount of that active ingredient then that should be building a case towards trafficking, but I just can't include it with all the other fillers and say suddenly we're redefining all this other stuff as just being meth.

And so, for that, I will be supporting the pending motion.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Baldacci.

Senator **BALDACC:** Thank you, Madam President. I just want to respectfully disagree because we're not lowering any standard, we're making the standard the same that we currently have in state law for heroin, cocaine, fentanyl. We're not lowering any standard. Second, when somebody mixes it with sugar or whatever compound, that is evidence that it's -- that they're trying to traffic. Because why -- it's not like they just dumped it in

spaghetti sauce and oh, unfortunately got it in my spaghetti sauce. No. It's part of an effort to conceal it, that is the purpose of doing that. So, I think -- I just wanted to take issue with those points and thank you very much.
