Senator **INGWERSEN:** Madam President and my Fellow Colleagues of the Senate, I rise today, am very excited and I have great pride and honor to introduce you to an extraordinary young man from my district, Biddeford High School senior Benjamin Descoteaux, who's been selected as a recipient of the 2025 Principal's Award by the Maine Principals' Association.

The Principal's Award is awarded to a single senior from over 100 public and private high schools, honoring students who go above and beyond in their school communities. Ben shared with me that watching his brother face life's challenges with courage and patience has inspired him to work hard, stay focused, and never take opportunities for granted. That perspective has grounded him to succeed, not just for himself but in honor of those who face barriers with grace every single day.

Biddeford High principal Martha Jacques described Ben as someone whose warmth, thoughtfulness, and ability to navigate complex issues have set him apart. She notes that, quote, Ben doesn't just rush to conclusions but takes the time to gather information and processes it in a way that I have not seen another high school student do. He is able to handle complex issues with confidence and competence and to advocate for those best interests of himself and for others, including those whose voices are not typically heard.

After graduation, Ben will be heading to Clemson University in South Carolina to study business. I have no doubt that wherever life takes Ben, he will continue to lead with empathy, with intellect, and purpose. It is young people like Ben who remind us of the great potential within our own communities, why investing in education, opportunity, and civic values are so important. And of course, when Ben is done with his adventures,

I hope to see him come back home to Maine and continue to do his great work in his community and in our state.

So, congratulations, Benjamin. Your community, your school, and your state are so very proud of you.

#### JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE LAST UNITED STATES COMBAT MISSION IN SOUTHEAST ASIA AT THE END OF THE VIETNAM WAR

WHEREAS, United States involvement in the Vietnam War ended 50 years ago with the Mayaguez Incident at Koh Tang, from May 12-15, 1975, the final United States combat mission in Southeast Asia during this conflict; and

WHEREAS, in May 1975 the Cambodian Khmer Rouge navy seized the American cargo ship SS Mayaguez and its crew of 39 in international waters. The Mayaguez was anchored at Koh Tang Island near the Cambodian coast, and military planners believed the crew was on the island. Air Force gunships sank 3 Cambodian patrol boats to prevent their taking the Mayaguez's

crew from Koh Tang to the mainland. Soon after, Marines boarded the Mayaguez and found it abandoned; and

WHEREAS, Marines landed on Koh Tang in Air Force helicopters to rescue the crew, but incomplete intelligence made the operation a near disaster. Expecting only light opposition, the Air Force helicopters instead faced heavy fire from a large force. The Cambodians shot down 4 helicopters, damaged 5 more and killed 14 Americans. More United States troops and aircraft urgently moved to reinforce the 131 Marines and 5 Air Force aircrew trapped on Koh Tang; and

WHEREAS, as the assault unfolded, the Mayaguez crew appeared in a small boat and were rescued unharmed. The operation immediately shifted from an offensive to rescuing the trapped Marines; and

WHEREAS, another 100 Marines moved into Koh Tang to reinforce and extract the trapped Marines. Coordinated Air Force support by attack aircraft, forward air controllers, rescue helicopters and gunships pounded Cambodian targets while the Americans on the ground fought hard to maintain their positions; and

WHEREAS, only 3 Air Force helicopters were left to extract more than 200 troops. They tried time and again, braving fierce, accurate fire, but were repeatedly driven off. Finally, they reached the beach and recovered 129 Marines in multiple trips, landing them quickly on Navy ships and returning to the island for more. On the last trip to the beach, Air Force pararescueman Tech. Sgt. Wayne Fisk left his helicopter to find 2 missing Marines still laying down covering fire. He led them to the helicopter, and the 14-hour rescue ended as the aircraft left under fire; and

WHEREAS, there were 3 Marines who were inadvertently left on the island in the darkness and confusion and were killed and buried there within a few days by the Khmer Rouge. Total United States casualties included 18 dead and 50 wounded. Twenty-three more Air Force personnel died in a support force helicopter crash in Thailand due to mechanical failure; and

WHEREAS, there were 48,000 men and women from the State of Maine who served in Vietnam, while an additional 16,000 Mainers were serving worldwide during the Vietnam War era; and

WHEREAS, the names of 343 Mainers who laid down their lives are etched on the black granite of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., and 11 of our men are still missing in Southeast Asia; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-second Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the 50th anniversary of the last United States combat mission in Southeast Asia at the end of the Vietnam War and to celebrate with the utmost gratitude the service and sacrifice of every Mainer who fought in Vietnam and Southeast Asia during the Vietnam War, especially those who paid the ultimate price and cannot be with us here today.

The Joint Resolution was **READ**.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Hickman.

Senator **HICKMAN:** Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, Women and Men of the Senate, good morning. I rise this morning in solemn remembrance of the day just over 50 years ago when the final American combat mission in Southeast Asia ended, bringing the two-decade-long Vietnam War to an end.

Many people cite the official end of the Vietnam War as April 30, 1975, when America's South Vietnamese allies surrendered to the North Vietnamese forces. However, the weeks' long struggle to escape the region and return home to the United States saw an additional skirmish, the Mayaguez incident we memorialize here today.

As we have just heard in the reading of the resolution, this was not a bloodless final victory, it was a hard-fought struggle that demonstrated the grit and determination of the young American men who were sent far away from their homes to fight on planes and on ships, in helicopters and in jungles. From village to village, island to island, exposed to some of the most dangerous chemicals known to humankind.

I shall spare you the additional history, but I would like to state for the record this day that we owe it to this generation of fighters, several of whom we are blessed to have joining us here today in this hallowed capitol, to properly welcome them home each and every day, and that is what we intend to do. Welcome home, those who served our country honorably, those who fought for our freedom, those who were wounded, or those who still grieve for their brethren who died in that war. And so, I say, welcome home.

I would like to extend a special welcome home to some veterans from my beloved hometown of Winthrop's chapter of the American Legion, the Alfred W. Maxwell, Jr., Post 40, an active post with both an auxiliary and a Sons of the American Legion, of which I am a member. They serve as an inspiration for me every single day as I do the work in this building, especially as I chair the Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs. Last month, Jack Lynch, Vice Commander of Post 40, invited me to a Vietnam veterans recognition event to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the conclusion of the war. While I was unable to join for the ceremony, I caught the end of the event, and when they shared there was one more anniversary remaining, the Mayaguez incident which we memorialized today, I took it upon myself to put this together. It was a perfect opportunity to recognize the service of this generation, right here in the Maine Senate.

Here with us today from the Winthrop Legion Post 40, we have Charles McGillicuddy, who served in the United States Army from 1967 to 69, Post 40 Commander Robert Dawson, who served in the United States Marine Corps from 1962 to 1966, Teco Brown, who served in the U.S. Army from 1967 to 1969, Scott Ainsworth, who served in the U.S. Army from 1990 to 1996, Jack Lynch, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1975 to 1979, and Doug Thomas, who served in the United States Army from 1978 to 1982.

I will close by welcoming a few other special guests who have graciously joined us in the Senate Chamber this morning to celebrate our veterans on this momentous anniversary. Brigadier General Diane Dunn, the Adjutant General of the Maine National Guard, and the Commissioner of the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management, David Richmond, the

Director of Maine Bureau of Veteran Services, both of whom are veterans themselves, and Ryan Lorrain, the Director of Communications for the Maine Bureau of Veterans Services.

Madam President, I will never forget as a youngster, seven and a half years old, seeing service members from Vietnam returning home on the television screen being spat on and called all kinds of names that grown people ought to have known better to call them. And so, I say again, we owe it to recognize the honorable and distinguished service of these men to our great nation. I'm so proud we are able to do this here today and in the House probably later on, and I say one final time, welcome home.

Thank you, Madam President.

**JOINT RESOLUTION  
RECOGNIZING MAY 2025 AS  
MAINE TREATMENT AND RECOVERY COURT MONTH**

WHEREAS, treatment and recovery courts nationwide are the cornerstone of justice reform and are recognized as the most successful justice system intervention in our Nation's history; and

WHEREAS, Maine's treatment and recovery courts have been restoring lives and families and increasing public health and safety for almost 3 decades; and

WHEREAS, Maine now has 14 treatment and recovery courts, including 8 adult drug treatment and recovery courts, 2 veterans treatment courts, 3 family recovery courts and one co-occurring disorder court; and

WHEREAS, Maine's treatment and recovery courts have served more than 2,800 individuals, indirectly impacting thousands of Maine families, employers and communities; and

WHEREAS, the most recent statewide assessment has shown that Maine's treatment and recovery courts have substantially lowered the conviction recidivism rate of graduates to 6% compared to 41% of people with comparable characteristics and criminal histories who did not participate in a treatment and recovery court program; and

WHEREAS, according to All Rise, treatment and recovery courts significantly improve substance use disorder treatment outcomes and substantially reduce addiction and related crime and do so at less expense than any other criminal justice strategy in Maine's history; and

WHEREAS, according to the statewide assessment, Maine's treatment and recovery courts save an average of \$16,232 in incarceration and community corrections costs for every individual served, permitting Maine to boast savings significantly more than the national average of \$6,000 per individual; and

WHEREAS, Maine's treatment and recovery courts improve education, employment, housing and financial stability; promote family reunification; reduce foster care placements; and increase the rate of mothers delivering babies who are fully drug-free; and

WHEREAS, Maine's treatment and recovery courts facilitate community-wide partnerships, bridging public safety and public health; and

WHEREAS, the success of Maine's treatment and recovery courts is the result of dedicated, collaborative efforts and partnerships with many state departments and organizations, including the Maine Judicial Branch, the Office of the Attorney General, the Governor's office of opioid response, Maine Prosecutors' Association, Maine Commission on Public Defense Services, the Department of Corrections, county sheriff's offices, the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine Health, Aroostook Mental Health Center, Wellspring, the Community Caring Collaborative, the Co-Occurring Collaborative Serving Maine, Maine Pretrial Services and the Maine Reentry Network, as well as a multitude of recovery centers and residences, independent treatment providers and physicians and recovery support organizations; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED:** That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-second Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate May 2025 as Maine Treatment and Recovery Court Month in recognition of the efforts of all professionals and participants who make our treatment and recovery courts work and of the significant contribution our treatment and recovery courts have made and continue to make in the fight against substance use disorder, by helping our citizens in their recovery and in restoring hope.

**JOINT RESOLUTION  
TO REAFFIRM THE FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN MAINE AND  
TAIWAN,  
ENHANCE BILATERAL TRADE RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN  
AND  
SUPPORT TAIWAN'S INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPATION**

WHEREAS, the United States and the Republic of China (Taiwan) share a robust bilateral relationship marked by a mutually beneficial partnership and supported by our common values of freedom, democracy, rule of law and a free market economy, and our countries now enjoy the strongest relations ever; and

WHEREAS, May 20, 2025 marks the 2nd year of the Honorables Dr. Lai Ching-te as President and Bi-khim Hsiao as Vice President of Taiwan, thereby demonstrating the vibrancy of Taiwan's democracy; and

WHEREAS, the United States ranks as Taiwan's 2nd-largest trading partner, and Taiwan is the 7th-largest trading partner of the United States in 2024, with United States trade in goods with Taiwan totaling an estimated \$157.8 billion, a 34.79% increase over 2023; and

WHEREAS, the government of Taiwan has expressed a desire to reach an Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement with the United States, which will increase Maine exports to Taiwan, bilateral investment and jobs in Maine; and

WHEREAS, Maine and Taiwan have enjoyed a long history of vibrant bilateral relations, including trade, as evidenced by Maine-Taiwan bilateral trade amounting to \$45.47 million in 2024 and Maine exports to Taiwan of \$27.95 million, making Taiwan Maine's 8th-largest export market in Asia; and

WHEREAS, a reciprocal driver's license agreement between Maine and Taiwan would greatly benefit drivers from both sides, including Maine-Taiwan exchange students and business people living and working in our respective jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, Maine's Department of Education and the Ministry of Education of the Republic of China (Taiwan) have entered into a memorandum of understanding to strengthen and enhance kindergarten to grade 12 educational exchange and cooperation and now seek to enter into a similar memorandum of understanding for higher education; and

WHEREAS, the United States government actively encourages engagement between the people of the United States and

Taiwan, especially at the state level, in terms of trade, investment, commerce, education and cultural exchanges and supports Taiwan's meaningful participation in international organizations, and United States policy toward Taiwan is guided by the Taiwan Relations Act of 1979 and not United Nations Resolution 2758 (1971), which neither mentions Taiwan nor prevents Taiwan's international participation; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is a reliable partner and trustworthy democratic ally, making its inclusion in international organizations such as the World Health Organization and the International Civil Aviation Organization imperative for the best interests and safety of the international community; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-second Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, support a stronger United States-Taiwan relationship under the Trump administration, including the signing of an Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement with the United States, a driver's license reciprocity agreement and a memorandum of understanding on higher education with Taiwan in the near future, and support pursuing ways to further increase trade and people-to-people exchanges; and be it further

RESOLVED: That we support Taiwan's legitimate right to participate in international organizations, agreements and mechanisms; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable Donald J. Trump, President of the United States, the members of the Maine Congressional Delegation, the Honorable Janet Mills, Governor of Maine, the Honorable Lai Ching-te, President of the Republic of China (Taiwan) and the Honorable Charles Liao, Director-General of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston, Massachusetts.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Talbot Ross.

Senator **TALBOT ROSS:** Thank you again, Madam President. I just wanted to stand and express my sincere thanks to our guests for joining us here today and to reaffirm how important the friendship between Maine and Taiwan is, as evidenced by the data that we just heard about. But to also talk about our strong working relationship that we now have with the cultural center of Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston. This office helps to manage ties with five New England states - Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Rhode Island, and Massachusetts - and we sincerely hope to increase opportunities for meaningful cooperation across the New England states by establishing a sister city relationship hopefully within this next year, and also exploring how the New England states can work on regional trade opportunities.

So, I just wanted to stand and say thank you again to our honorable guest. I also wanted to just say how grateful I think the state of Maine is for this relationship with Taiwan through Taipei, particularly, and hope that our ties just get stronger and stronger moving forward.

So, thank you very much, Madam President.

Senator **LAWRENCE** of York moved the Senate **ACCEPT** the Majority **OUGHT NOT TO PASS** Report, in concurrence.

On motion by Senator **HARRINGTON** of York, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair now recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Harrington.

Senator **HARRINGTON:** Thank you, Madam President. I rise in opposition to the pending motion.

I think with the development -- mass development of solar in the state of Maine, I think the people of Maine deserve to know what this is doing to the soil underneath these panels. This bill is pretty straightforward. It requires simply that the soil be tested prior to, during, and after installation of solar panels for PFAS. PFAS seems to be a rising concern in this Chamber for every other application other than when it comes to solar panels, which we know have PFAS in them.

So, I would encourage you to vote against the current motion and support this bill. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lawrence.

Senator **LAWRENCE:** Thank you, Madam President. I hope you will oppose this bill. This is the only industry I can think of that we're singling out in this fashion with a special bill to try to determine if it has PFAS. There's ways to determine through the ENR committee. They've done on determining what products that are used, what elements that are used have PFAS. But what really enrages me about this bill is it's going to cost a million dollars a year to implement. A million dollars a year. And when we're in such tight budget situation, having to make difficult choices, why would we want to add a million dollars a year to the budget. It would require somebody to go out and test land before a solar farm is put on it, then test it afterwards, and then make a determination if there is an increase in PFAS whether it's coming

from the products used in the solar farm. It's absolutely ridiculous. I know the proclivity of some people to spend a lot of money, but this is a million dollars that would be wasted, and I hope you'll vote it down. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Cyrway.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I need to speak up on that situation just mentioned.

You know, growing up, I grew up on a farm, and it was the times when they were having the buyouts for cattle and because we had a surplus of milk. And when they did, that's when we -- this kind of -- the PFAS issue really became a problem and at that time, the EPA said there was no problem and they allowed it and had the -- our human waste being spread on the fields so that -- because the cattle weren't there anymore, it was just the heifers and there wasn't enough to supply the hay fields so that they -- the farmers thought that it was okay. And so, we're doing this again? I think that maybe we should rethink this before we go and vote and say oh, it's too much money. Because once you do it, it's forever. And it took, you know, a lot of farmers by surprise when this hit us and we found in my area, especially, in Fairfield Center, where it was the highest in the whole United States.

And so, we don't know what these solar farms are doing and we don't know the answers, and I think for us to just say -- and push a button and say it's okay because it's too much money, it wouldn't hurt to test prior to and maybe do some tests and find out what the end results could be before and not after.

So, Madam President, and I really think it is serious. I know we had farmers that cried, that it took their farms away. And I've heard some other people that were crying because they had the well issues, and now we're even finding that now they tried to correct it by putting these nice filter systems in and now they're running out of money, the State's running out of money to supply those filters and it's going to be very costly to the people that own those homes. And so, this is a big mistake, I think, that just -- and maybe there's an easier answer of testing and finding out this answer, but I just want to say don't do it by pushing this button and say let's -- let's ignore this. Because we've done it once, why do it again? That's what I'm saying.

Thank you, Madam President.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair now recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Libby.

Senator **LIBBY:** Thank you, Madam Chair -- Madam President, Men and Women of the Senate. I just want to bring a story to you, and it was just something that I'll never forget. I was in the House Chamber, I believe it was, in the 1990s and Angus King, who we keep talking about in here, had just become Governor, and I was behind a bill to look at and, in that case, ban MTBE. It was a gasoline additive that we decided nationwide that we would add. Well, we had some early preliminary scientific reports on MTBE and what it basically said was that this is a chemical that is soluble in water and it's very difficult to clean. And so, anyway, we had -- to make a long story short, we had an incredible fight, it was a battle, it was a very close vote in both Chambers, and it was right at the end of the session, which a lot of these bills are, the controversial ones, and so, I lost, we lost the vote. And I'll never forget the next morning, waking up at about ten in the

morning because you know how the last day of session is, you're absolutely -- you're here all night, you're exhausted, and I was in my home just kind of like barely awake, sitting on my couch, and I got a phone call from Angus King. And I couldn't believe it. And I -- hey, Angus, great talking to you, and he said why is it that you're so adamant about this MTBE issue? And I said to him well, I mean, what I'd like to do is just send you a scientific report about why we need to get this out of our environment, and these are -- these are scientific reports that are based on spills that have occurred all over the United States and the level of pollution is significant, we don't want that to happen in Maine. And so, I sent it to him, and I heard from him two days later and basically what he said was look, I want you to come up, we're going to have a press conference. I know I fought you on this with the help of the Legislature, I fought you on the MTBE bill, but I'm going to invite you up, we're going to have a press conference, and we are going to get this substance out of Maine and we're going to make sure that it doesn't poison our well water. Well, you can imagine how thrilled I was. Later on, I told him and others in this -- in this Chamber, a few years later, that the spreading of sludge had a similar problem, that there were contaminants in the sludge and we really ought not be spreading that all over our farmers' fields. And nobody listened. Nobody listened to the arguments of the minority, and what did we end up with? I mean -- and I'm not saying minority party, I'm saying there were -- it was bipartisan, but what did we end up with? You know what we ended up with, we ended up with polluted farmers' fields.

It's clear to all of us that PFAS is a problem and we're a leader in the nation on this issue. And I do think that -- and I agree that the Senator from Kennebec spoke very wisely when he said maybe there's another way to do this. Whatever it takes, I mean, we really should not -- we've got, especially in my rural district, acres and acres and acres of these solar panels. And if -- when the rain hits them or whatever the weather is, it's leaking PFAS into the ground, I want to know. You want to know. And we don't want to let it go on for a long period of time. So, I -- just thinking about that whole issue, it -- it just reminds me of other mistakes that we've made, and I think we need to learn from our mistakes.

So, I would encourage you to vote against the pending motion and support the Minority Report.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lawrence.

Senator **LAWRENCE:** Thank you, Madam President, and just in response to the two prior speakers, there is a better way to do this, and it is being done now. It is in our environmental statutes. It is saying whenever products are used - it identifies products that has PFAS in them and sets restrictions on the use of them. And that will apply to solar developers, that will apply to farmers, that will apply if you're putting in a Dairy Queen, if you're putting anything on a property, that applies. What this bill is about, it's directing at a specific industry and trying to place a burden on this industry. And the purpose behind it is not PFAS, it's to slow down renewables and keep us reliant on oil, coal, and natural gas. That's the purpose of this bill.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Libby.

Senator **LIBBY**: Thank you, Madam President. I want to thank the Good Senator from York for bringing up those issues, and I don't disagree that some people may feel like solar development is problematic, doesn't bring us enough energy, and so forth, but that's not my argument here, I don't think that way at all. My problem is that I'm looking at solar farms and there's just a concentrated area of one product, and because it's so concentrated, one might think that there is more of an opportunity for there to be a PFAS problem. We've identified that there's PFAS in the panels, so I would think that we would want to take this step and try to, you know, take a strong position on the concentration of these panels, not try to block solar. Solar is one energy alternative that we all should embrace. That's really not what this is about at all. Thank you very much.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass report. A roll call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?

Basically, this bill clarifies that the State, its political  
subdivisions, and government entities may not infringe on the  
authority of parents to direct the upbringing, education, and care  
for the physical, mental, and spiritual health of the child unless  
there is child abuse and other things that are happening that are  
against the law.

Moms and dads and guardians need to have support --  
excuse me -- parental control of their children's lives. There are a  
lot of things that have been legislated in this -- in this big building  
where parents have no control over what happens to their  
children, especially ages 16 and 17. The age of adulthood or  
consent or whatever words we would use is 18. And until they're  
18, they are not ready. It's been said many times upstairs on the  
fourth floor, the prefrontal lobe is not developed and whatnot until  
age 26. That's when my insurance went way down back in the  
day, in the '80s. So, I think that moms and dads should have  
more say with education. Being a public-school teacher for a long

time, there's a lot of new things that have come down the path of the public schools that parents don't agree with, and they call me crying, you know, what do I do? What do I do? I'm not a licensed counselor, I can't advise. And I can give a thousand different reasons and I could speak until tomorrow morning as to why parents should have control over the people that they brought into this world, and they love dearly.

So, for me, this is an easy, easy vote. We've got to give the parents the proper respect and rights to guide their children into adulthood the way they see fit.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Guerin.

Senator **GUERIN:** Madam President, Esteemed Members of the Senate, fellow Mainers, and defenders of liberty, I stand today to champion LD 492, a bill that seeks to enshrine in our state law the fundamental rights of parents to direct the upbringing, education, and care of our children.

This is not a matter of political expediency, but a bedrock principle rooted in the very fabric of our constitutional republic. Let us be clear, the right of parents to raise their children is not a privilege granted by the State, but a preexisting inherent right. It is a natural right, recognized and protected by the foundational documents of our nation. The 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution declares that no state shall deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law. The Supreme Court, in a long line of landmark cases, has consistently recognized that the liberty interest protected by this amendment includes the right of parents to direct the upbringing and education of their children. In *Meyer v. Nebraska*, the court struck down a state law that prohibited the teaching of foreign languages, stating that the 14th Amendment's liberty guarantee includes the right to establish a home and bring up children. In *Pierce v. Society of Sisters*, the court affirmed the right of parents to choose their children's education, including the right to send them to private schools.

These cases established a clear and unwavering precedent, the right of parents to control their children's education and upbringing is a fundamental liberty. This is not a mere suggestion, but a constitutional mandate. Furthermore, the Ninth Amendment reminds us that the enumeration of several rights in the Constitution shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people. This acknowledges that not all rights are explicitly listed, that the people retain enumerable rights, including the right to raise their children as they see fit. This amendment serves as a safeguard against government overreach, preventing the State from claiming authority over areas rightfully belonging to individuals and families.

LD 492 seeks to codify these constitutional principles in Maine law, ensuring that parental rights are not subject to the whims of shifting political tides or bureaucratic overreach. It seeks to establish a clear and unambiguous standard, protecting families from intrusive state actions. Some argue that the State has a compelling interest in the welfare of children. I agree. But this interest must be balanced against the fundamental rights of parents. The State's role is not to supplant parental authority, but to support and supplement it, stepping in only when there is clear and convincing evidence of abuse or neglect.

LD 492 is not about denying the State its legitimate role. It is about affirming the primacy of the family, recognizing that parents

who love and know their children best are the primary caretakers and decision makers in their lives. This bill is about protecting the sacred bond between parent and child, ensuring that the State respects the fundamental rights of families. Let us stand together, united in our commitment to liberty and constitutional principle that parents, not the State, are the rightful guardians of their children. Let our voices ring out across the state declaring Maine will protect parental rights.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Carney.

Senator **CARNEY:** Thank you, Madam President. I'm pleased to speak in support of the pending motion.

I did want to point out to my colleagues that Maine already has constitutional rights for parents that are far greater than any other state. Our law court also has issued a long series of decisions that protect and actually show great deference to the fundamental rights of parents to parent their children. What passing this legislation would entail is upending that strong track record of court decisions as well as creating uncertainty in many areas of existing law.

So, one of those areas, of course, is the rights of 16- and 17-year-olds to obtain treatment for substance use and mental health disorders and to have privacy in their medical records. There are lots of other examples. For instance, the Maine Schoolboard Association pointed out that while the Maine Schoolboard Association reaffirms the commitment to parental rights and parental engagement, there are certain rights that are established under federal law, under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, and other federal laws, as well as state laws that would be called into question by this legislation.

And then, finally, the Office of Child and Family Services noted that these proposed amendments would call into question the government involvement when a child is at risk of abuse and neglect. They would also call into question the current parental rights and responsibilities determinations that are made in our district courts when there is a family law dispute, and then finally they would make it difficult for the State to follow its existing processes in overseeing education, including of homeschooled children.

So, I would urge my colleagues to vote in support of the pending motion. Unfortunately, this proposal would jeopardize the existing protections that adequately support parents' rights in our state.

Senator **BENNETT**: Thank you, Madam President, Fellow Members of the Senate. This issue is one that deserves some attention because the effect of solar panel fields and their visual

significance is something which is unignorable and something which I'm pleased that this -- the Environment and Natural Resources Committee took some time to review.

I encourage you not to vote for the Ought Not to Pass Report. The Ought to Pass as Amended Report is modest in changing site location law to require the Department of Environmental Protection to consider scenic values as part of the considerations.

I'd like to share with you the words of a constituent of mine, Elizabeth Boepple of Fryeburg, and her husband wrote on this bill and testified - and I have to say Elizabeth Boepple is an amazing and impressive, well credentialed land use and environmental attorney who gives a substantial amount of thought to issues like this. I'm going to quote from her letter to the PUC regarding this issue. Quote, we live in Fryeburg. Over the past, a large rambling solar farm was constructed just off Route 302, heading out of town toward Bridgton. Please do not misread either of us or the town as being anything but pro alternative energy. However, this referenced project is an eyesore, to say the least. The town has reacted in its only legal way, but it is after the horse has left the barn. From our viewpoint, as well as the citizens and government of Fryeburg, there should've been a visual barrier between it and the immediate residential housing as well as any travelers into and out of our really lovely town. Our very clear conclusion is that such a utility project should have guidelines and controls designed by the State. Maine greenlighted these for-profit projects owned by no one from Fryeburg and perhaps no one from the state of Maine. All of the motivation was triggered by state financial and tax policy. There is absolutely no reason why all the advantages for these projects should be with the for-profit developer. There is almost no negative impact on the developer to add -- to adding plantings as a green visual barrier. To the contrary, it would repair his damaged reputation. Fryeburg and its citizens are left with the only option of paying for the corrective action themselves.

The State set up the program, she goes on to write, to financially induce such investors to come in and construct such solar farms, and we agree with such an approach 100%. However, there is no reason, she writes, to scar the landscape, and having done so, the town should not be left holding the bag. If anything, all municipalities in the state should've been informed of the imminent changes that were going to affect them. They should've been given the chance to make any alterations to their local codes. All the advantages cannot be with the developer. The only reasonable thing to do in our estimation is for the State to provide plantings at its expense to hide the scars. We hope that such a correction -- corrective action for towns across the state will follow, she and her husband, Bruce Baker, wrote.

I think the measure before us is maybe a little late to the -- to the public policy debate, unhappily, but there is still a lot of pending projects out there, and I think it's a fairly modest request that -- to have the state consider in approving these projects visual effects and scenic impacts.

Thank you, Madam President.

borders on any solar field in its municipality, it is entitled to do so. This is in some ways a bill that interferes with home rule and decision making by local communities and so, I ask you to follow me on the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

In fact, I was a first responder for five years on a fire department, I understand what the risks are, and I understand what my colleagues who I used to work with are potentially going through. The minority Report here is a referencing issue, sending it to a different committee in Labor because we feel that this issue, while an important one to discuss, is not being appropriately tackled through this committee and this committee process and would like to see it sent there to tackle this problem in a different part of our statute, namely around Workers' Comp.

So, that's where the opposition would be coming from from this Roll Call and I just wanted to set the record straight for that so that anybody paying attention today or reviewing this understands where the Republicans and several other first responders within our caucus are coming from with an impending no vote. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair now recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Bailey.

Senator **BAILEY:** Thank you, Madam President. I just wanted to briefly respond to those comments.

The Health Coverage Insurance and Financial Services Committee has dealt with this issue both last session and this session. It is about a health insurance coverage issue and whether in fact there is going to be coverage for prescreening testing for our first responders for the work that they do and the exposures that they do have and the high risk that they have for heart problems and cancers and the like. Workers' Comp already has similar rebuttable presumptions in the Workers' Comp statute. Workers' Comp, of course, does not cover anything up front and we are trying to move something forward that would give coverage up front so that these diseases can be prevented and not have to put in a claim for Workers' Comp after our first

responders have already gotten sick. Thank you.

Senator **CYRWAY:** Madam President, I rise today in opposition to the -- to supporting LD 486, I am supporting the motion.

The basis of this repeal on this bill relies on the basic right of self-defense. Everyone who is threatened has the right to use proportionate force to defend oneself. However, current law requires someone who is threatened by unlawful deadly force to

retreat before defending themselves, potentially leading to them being harmed or killed. In other words, a lawful citizen trying to protect themselves would have to follow the commands of a person attacking them.

In his testimony, the sponsor provided a series of examples where a victim would lose their self-defense claim for failing to follow a command such as leave this park or I will kill you. People should be allowed to defend themselves if they are threatened, not to have to follow commands from the person threatening them.

Let's be clear, repealing the duty to retreat does not constitute the passage of a Stand Your Ground Act. Twenty states have neither a duty to retreat nor Stand Your Ground Act. This simply gives the law-abiding citizen of Maine greater discretion in when to use proportionate force to defend themselves.

So, I would vote in favor of the motion. Thank you, Madam President.
