During the 107th to the 110th legislatures he served as the Minority Leader and during the 105th legislature as Assistant Minority Leader. He served in the House during the 102nd and the 103rd legislatures. I want to thank President Conley for his service. The Secretary has a gift for you, President Conley. Thanks for coming today.

Next I'd like to recognize the Honorable Richard Bennett. He was President during the 120th legislature. He served during the 118th through the 121st legislature. During the 119th legislature he served as Assistant Minority Leader. He also served in the House during the 115th and 116th legislatures. Thank you, President Bennett, for your service.

Now I would like to take the opportunity to recognize the Honorable Elizabeth Mitchell. She's not in the Chamber currently, but we'll certainly recognize her when she arrives. I wanted to talk about her service. She was President during the 124th legislature. She served during the 122nd and 123rd legislatures. During the 123rd legislature she served as the Majority Leader. She was a member of the House from the 107th to the 118th. She

served as Speaker during the 118th legislature. President Mitchell is the first woman in the United States to have been chosen in the State Legislature for both the position of Speaker of the House and President of the Maine Senate. Thank you, President Mitchell, for your service. When she arrives we will announce her and give her her gift as well.

Lastly, I'd like to recognize the Honorable Justin Alfond. Senator Alfond served as President during the 126th legislature. He served in this Chamber since the 124th legislature and currently serves as the Minority Leader. Would the Sergeant-At-Arms please escort Senator Alfond to the rostrum to accept a gift on behalf of the Senate.

Now it's our opportunity to recognize the folks that really make this Chamber work. The first individual that we're going to recognize is not in the Chamber currently but down to the House, and when he arrives in the Chamber we will recognize him at that time. I want to tell you about the Honorable Ed Pert. He served as Secretary during the 102nd legislature. Next I'd like to recognize the Honorable Joseph G. Carleton who served as Secretary during the 125th legislature. He also served in the House during the 115th through the 118th legislatures and as Assistant Minority Leader during the 117th legislature. Thank you, Secretary Carleton, for your service.

Last, but certainly not least, I'd like to recognize the Honorable Darek Grant. He served as Secretary during the 126th Senate session. He also served as a staff member here since the 121st legislature. Thank you, Secretary Grant, for your service.

None of these individuals would have been as successful as they were without their Assistants. Senator VOLK: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, it's not easy to put together a best of the best team of players from around the state. A lot of times, I know from personal experience, that players have a certain position and they want to play that position and if they can't be the top player in that position then they'll leave and go to another organization. The Junior Pirates organization is a very well run organization. It's very professional, with their affiliation with the Portland Pirates. They were able to do just that. They put together this group of girls from Wells to Lewiston and they range in age from a young side of 13 years old all the way up to 18 years old. They improved all year long. They practiced in Saco five hours a week, three hours on ice and two hours off ice, and pushed each other and they didn't lose throughout the State's Regionals or the National's, which was held in Lansing, Michigan. This team represented Maine with class, with hard work, and the Junior Pirates organization is the only organization that actually produced two championship teams at this particular national tournament. We have a lot to be proud of and I'm very pleased to have many members of the team and their parents here with us in the Chamber today. I just want to congratulate them, as I'm sure you do as well.

JOINT RESOLUTION IN HONOR OF THE CONTRIBUTIONS THAT WOMEN MAKE TO THE PEOPLE OF MAINE

WHEREAS, American women of every race, class and ethnic background have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of our nation in countless recorded and unrecorded ways, especially in the areas of political and social change; and

WHEREAS, the United States boasts a rich history of women whose vast and courageous achievements speak to the sense of excellence and potential shared by all Americans; and

WHEREAS, our country would not have attained its greatness without the strength, bravery, insight and persistence of the women who have come before us; and

WHEREAS, American women have played, and continue to play, critical economic, cultural, political and social roles in every sphere of the life of the nation by constituting a significant portion of the labor force working inside and outside of the home and in professions from educator to astronaut, yet make up a very small percentage of the executives in charge of Fortune 500 companies each year; and

WHEREAS, women have played a major role in the defense of our nation, both on and off the battlefield; and

WHEREAS, American women have been leaders, not only in securing their own rights of suffrage and equal opportunity but also in the abolitionist movement, the industrial labor movement, the civil rights movement and other movements that create a more fair and just society for all; and

WHEREAS, women not only have played critical economic, cultural and social roles in our society but also have permanently changed the face of American government and politics; and

WHEREAS, Maine has a rich and vibrant history of women in leadership, including Senator Margaret Chase Smith, who was perhaps best known for her contribution to the well-being of the United States and its people with her condemnation of bigotry and injustice wherever she found them; and

WHEREAS, Senator Margaret Chase Smith was the first woman from Maine to serve in the United States Congress, the first woman in the nation elected to both houses of the United States Congress and the first woman to be placed in nomination for the presidency at a major party's convention; and

WHEREAS, Maine currently has some of the strongest women leaders in the nation, including Senator Susan Collins, the first woman to run for Maine Governor from a major party, and the recently retired Senator Olympia J. Snowe, the first woman to serve in both chambers of a state legislature and both chambers of the United States Congress; and

WHEREAS, the Maine Legislature has a distinguished record of women elected to leadership positions, including the Honorable Beverly Daggett, the first female President of the Senate, the Honorable Betheda Edmonds, the first woman to serve 2 terms as President of the Senate and the Honorable Elizabeth Mitchell, the first woman in the United States to have been chosen in a state legislature as both Speaker of the House and President of the Senate; and

WHEREAS, among the many women who have served in the Maine Legislature are the Honorable Hannah Pingree, the youngest woman to hold the position of Speaker of the House, and the many women who have served as Senate floor leaders, including the Honorable Jane A. Amero, the Honorable Pamela Cahill, the Honorable Nancy Randall Clark, the Honorable Chellie Pingree, the Honorable Sharon Treat, the Honorable Mary Small and the Honorable Carol Weston, and who have served as House floor leaders, including the Honorable Lucia M. Cormier, the

Honorable Emily Cain, the Honorable Carol A. Kontos and the Honorable Mary Clark Webster; and

WHEREAS, women who have served as assistant leaders in the Maine Legislature include the Honorable Minnette Cummings, the Honorable Barbara A. Gill, the Honorable Beverly Bustin-Hatheway, the Honorable Anne Rand, the Honorable Lisa Marraché, the Honorable Debra Plowman, the Honorable Elizabeth D. Moffatt, the Honorable Mary Najarian and the Honorable Anne Haskell; and

WHEREAS, women currently serving in positions of leadership include the Honorable Dawn Hill as Assistant Senate Minority Leader, the Honorable Sara Gideon as Assistant House Majority Leader and the Honorable Eleanor Espling as Assistant House Minority Leader; and

WHEREAS, women have served and currently serve in top legislative offices as Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House, including the Honorable May Ross, the first woman elected Secretary of the Senate, the Honorable Joy O'Brien, the longest-serving Secretary of the Senate in Maine's history, the Honorable Heather Priest, the first woman to serve as both Clerk of the House and Secretary of the Senate in Maine, the Honorable Bertha Johnson, the first woman elected Clerk of the House and the Honorable Millicent MacFarland, the longest-serving female Clerk of the House; and

WHEREAS, within our state judicial system, Chief Justice Leigh I. Saufley is the first woman to serve as Maine's Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Janet T. Mills is the first woman to have served as Maine's Attorney General, as well as being a former District Attorney and Legislator; the Honorable Dale McCormick is the first woman to serve as Treasurer of State, as well as being a former Legislator; the Honorable Gail Chase is the first woman to serve as State Auditor, as well as being a former Legislator; Pola Buckley is the current State Auditor; and the Honorable Teresea Hayes is the Treasurer of State as well as being a former Legislator and Assistant House Minority Leader; and

WHEREAS, we must take every action possible to promote women in leadership so that we can achieve fair representation in our State Government, including recognizing Maine women's contributions to our state history; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the contributions of women to Maine government and to the People of Maine.

Pursuant to 20-A M.R.S.A., Chapter 417-A, Section 11427, enclosed is a copy of the Maine Educational Loan Authority's (MELA) annual report for the fiscal year January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

MELA's annual report includes the following sections: introduction and background information; program administration (loan origination and servicing); application volume and distribution; loan volume; borrower distribution; financial counseling and literacy; summary; charts and graphs to illustrate the narrative contained within the report; and basic financial statements with management discussion and analysis.

MELA was established in 1988 to assist Maine students and their families in achieving their higher education goals by providing a supplemental or alternative student loan program. In 2014, MELA's supplemental student loan program consisted of The Maine Loan®, The Maine Medical Loan and MELA Private Consolidation Loan . The Maine Loan, MELA's primary student loan product, exists to bridge the gap between the full cost of undergraduate and graduate higher education and other traditional financial aid resources such as scholarships, grants, and the Federal education loan programs. The Maine Medical Loan was created in 1998 to assist Maine students pursuing a Doctor of Medicine (MD) or Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine (DO) degree. MELA expanded the scope of its medical loan program in 2002 to include other degrees such as dentistry, chiropractic. and veterinary medicine. This loan program is available to eligible medical students to borrow funds up to the full cost of a medical degree less other financial aid. The MELA Private Consolidation Loan, which allowed borrowers with qualifying alternative or private education loans to consolidate these loans, was offered through June 30, 2014.

Students attending Maine's public and private institutions of higher education continue to be the greatest beneficiaries of MELA loans. MELA's loan volume in 2014 was \$7,151,316 in

originations, which is an increase of 10% when compared with the \$6,474,442 originated in fiscal year 2013. It is expected that there will be a continuing demand for supplemental student loans for a number of reasons, including the impact of the prolonged difficult economic conditions on state funding for higher education, employment opportunities, and individual wealth. In addition, the high cost of attendance at higher education institutions requires increased borrowing by students and their families to cover the gap between the full cost of a college education and traditional financial aid resources.

On July 15, 2014, MELA issued \$10,466,098 (including original issue premium) in tax-exempt student loan revenue bonds. MELA's 2014 bond issue enabled the Authority to offer three fixed interest rates depending on the repayment option selected by the borrower. Two of MELA's fixed interest rates were lower than the William D. Ford Federal Direct PLUS Loan rate of 7.21% for the 2014-2015 academic year. MELA's repayment options and the percentage of borrowers utilizing each option included: immediate repayment of principal and interest (12%), interest only payments, and deferment of principal and interest payments (35%).

Baker Newman and Noyes LLC, an independent certified public accounting firm, recently completed MELA's financial audit for the 2014 fiscal year. In reviewing the financial statements, it is clear that the funds MELA has acquired with proceeds from tax-exempt bonds or obligations are being solely utilized for its alternative student loan program.

In summary, MELA looks forward to continuing to fulfill its mission of providing cost effective supplemental education financing to assist Maine students and families in achieving their higher education goals. MELA considers it to be a privilege to continue to partner with the State of Maine in making a college education more accessible and affordable for its residents.
