Senator BLACK: Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. It is with great pleasure that I stand before you today, having the opportunity to commemorate the attentiveness, quick thinking, and heroism of these three young, fine men. Around noontime on November 28th, Farmington P.D. received a report of a woman had gone and not returned home from her regular trip to the gym at UMF and was officially considered missing, with a silver alert being issued shortly thereafter. As it turns out, she had parked her car behind the UM -- University of Maine's rec center, far away from her usual normal spot, and had collapsed on the way back to her vehicle, completely going unnoticed. She remained on the ground for several hours, where her core temperature steadily dropping before Andrew, Jimmy, and Luke happened to notice her as they took an exceptionally well-timed extra lap around the grounds as part of their practice. They were on -- actually were on their ninth mile and it was their last mile when they found this lady, and it was just by chance that they looked out and saw that there was a car up back with a door open, it had been open, and they didn't even -- couldn't even see her at the time, but they went and investigated because they realized something wasn't right. Upon finding her, these three did not hesitate into springing into action and coordinate a team to ensure her survival. Before medical personnel was able to arrive on the scene, Mr. Reel helped relay first aid instructions from professionals over the phone to his teammates. If it was not for these valiant efforts, there was a very reasonable chance that this woman would have remained undetected and not survived until morning. Gentlemen, please accept my gratitude and adoration for your outstanding work and your cool headedness in a moment of serious crisis, and that of the entire Senate body. We are grateful to have students like yourself representing our state, and hopefully with some bright things to come in each of your futures. Thank you very much for being here today.
