WHEREAS, the State of Maine is named after the Province of Maine in France, and the towns of Paris and Calais owe their names to the capital city of France and the French port city of Calais, respectively; and

WHEREAS, more than 1/3 of the population of Maine is of French and Canadian descent, and Franco-Americans in Maine have contributed much to the beauty and quality of this State; and

WHEREAS, French is the primary language of thousands of Maine citizens and there has been a resurgence in the use of the French language and a heightened appreciation of Franco-American heritage throughout the State; and

WHEREAS, clubs and organizations to promote French culture and language have sprung up throughout the State, including the Franco-American Caucus at the State Capitol; and

WHEREAS, fluent French-English bilingual people are a cultural and economic resource to the State; and

WHEREAS, cultural tourism can be greatly enhanced by the genuine Franco-American centers throughout the State, and the large Franco-American presence in Maine can further strengthen our relationships with Canada, France and the rest of the francophone world; and

WHEREAS, the first Franco-American Day was celebrated in March 2002 at the State Capitol; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, proclaim that Tuesday, March 12, 2024 is Franco-American Day, to be celebrated at the State Capitol; and be it further

RESOLVED: That Franco-American Day be celebrated to commemorate the rich history of the French people in the State of Maine and the United States of America.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MARCH 8, 2024 AS INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

WHEREAS, International Women's Day has been celebrated since 1911; and

WHEREAS, Maine women have contributed greatly to the State's, the country's and the world's history; and

WHEREAS, those Maine women include Frances Perkins, the first woman appointed to the United States Cabinet; Margaret

Chase Smith, the first woman to serve in both the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate: Olympia Snowe, the first woman to serve in both chambers at both the state and federal levels; Edna St. Vincent Millay, a Pulitzer Prizewinning poet; Cornelia "Fly Rod" Crosby, the first registered Maine guide; Samantha Smith, an international peace advocate; Gail Laughlin, the first woman in Maine to practice law; Dorothea Dix, a nurse and advocate for the mentally ill; Frannie Peabody, an HIV/AIDS activist; Judith Isaacson, a Holocaust survivor and educator; Mary Low, one of the first American women to receive a Bachelor of Arts degree; Elizabeth Russell, a groundbreaking geneticist; Florence Whitehouse, a suffragist, activist and novelist; Rachel Talbot Ross, the first African American woman to serve as Speaker of the Maine House of Representatives: Valerie Stanfill, currently serving as Chief Justice of the Maine Supreme Judicial Court; and Janet T. Mills, the first woman in Maine to serve as Attorney General of Maine and the first woman to serve as Governor of Maine; and

WHEREAS, according to the Center for American Women and Politics, in 2024 a record 32.8% of the 7,386 seats in the 99 state legislative chambers in the United States are currently held by women, including 43.5% of the seats in the Maine Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Maine is one of 26 states with a woman serving as a presiding officer of its Legislature; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the contributions of Maine women throughout our history, the ongoing march toward gender equality, both in Maine and around the world, and the designation of March 8, 2024 as International Women's Day.

Comes from the House, READ and ADOPTED.

The Joint Resolution was **READ**.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Vitelli.

Senator VITELLI: Thank you, Mr. President, Men and Women of the Senate. I rise today to speak in favor of the Joint Resolution that is before us. The promise of democracy is that every citizen has an equal voice in the governance of their country, state, and town. When each person is able to take part in democracy, bringing their own unique perspective, values, and experience, our lives become -- our laws, excuse me, become more representative of the people they're meant to serve. It was the pursuit of this promise that guided the women who attended the Seneca Falls Convention in 1848. This convention and the Declaration of Sentiments that came from it are largely considered to be the formal start of the women's suffrage movement; the fight for women to have an equal share in U.S. democracy. The Declaration of Sentiments opens with an echo of the Declaration of Independence: We hold these truths to be selfevident, that all men and women are created equal. It goes on to enumerate the injustices that women had suffered up to that point as a direct result of being on unequal footing politically, economically, and socially. The women who met at the Seneca

Falls Convention knew they had their work cut out for them. The work of democracy is just that - hard work. It is frequently unglamourous but always deeply necessary. On International Women's Day, it is fitting that we take time to reflect on the hard work of the early suffragettes in this country and elsewhere who fought to extend the rights and promise of democracy to women and other groups long excluded from self-government. Today, I have the privilege of serving in the Senate alongside 13 other women from both sides of the political aisle. Each of us brings our own experience and values to this Chamber and to our votes. Even as we disagree, we trust that each of us comes to the State House with a sense of duty to the constituents who are entrusting us to represent them. It's in this sharing of differing and diverse perspectives that our democracy is made stronger, and every day, as all of us here in this Chamber exercise our democratic duties, we serve as a beacon to men and women around the world who are also engaging - or trying to - in the arduous work of democratic self-governance, with the promise that it brings of liberty and justice for all. Thank you, Mr. President.

Please accept this letter as a report of the findings of the Joint Standing Committee on Marine Resources from its review and evaluation of the Lobster Advisory Council under the State Government Evaluation Act, Title 3 of the Maine Revised Statutes, chapter 35.

The committee heard a presentation from the Lobster Advisory Council on February 1, 2024, and finds that the Council is operating within its statutory authority; however, we are recommending that, moving forward, the Lobster Advisory Council be removed from the list of agencies regularly scheduled for review under the State Government Evaluation Act. We make this recommendation because many of the requirements of the GEA are not germane to the Lobster Advisory Council's structure or work. The committee has proposed legislation to effectuate this change.

She served on the University of Maine System Board of Trustees from 1987 to 1997 and in 1991 became only the second woman to serve as board chair. She was a member of the Caribou School Board, chair of the Maine Committee for Judicial Responsibility and Disability, a member of the Board of Visitors at the University of Maine at Presque Isle, a member of the advisory committee of the Maine Public Broadcasting Network, a court-appointed special advocate for children, chair of the Catholic Charities Maine Board of Directors and the Catholic Foundation of Maine Board of Trustees and one of two New England representatives to the National Advisory Council of the Conference of Catholic Bishops. She also was a painter, photographer and cook, writing two cookbooks, "Fifty Years of Cooking 1948-1998" and "Encore 1998-2010." She directed religious education programming at Holy Rosary Church in Caribou for nine years. Among the honors and awards she received were an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of Maine at Presque Isle, the Deborah Morton Award from Westbrook College, the Black Bear Award from the University of Maine General Alumni Association, the Diocesan Miraculous Conception Medal and the Fogler Legacy Award from the University of Maine, which was awarded to the Don and Pat Collins Family. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Moore.

Senator MOORE: Thank you, Mr. President. I just wanted to take an opportunity to say a few words about this important bill. The National Crime Information Center maintains a missing person file as well as an unidentified person file. The latter has been active since 1983. It includes records of deceased but unidentified people, living people who are unable to ascertain their own identities, and catastrophic victims who die in a catastrophe and whose identity cannot be confirmed due to bodily trauma. As of December 31, 2022, the were 8,450 unidentified people in the database, including 902 records entered in 2022. Of the 8,450 persons, 581 were unidentified remains, five were catastrophic victims, and 316 were living persons. In the State of Maine, the Chief Medical Examiner's Office is responsible or is the state clearinghouse for Maine's missing and unidentified people. They currently have 27 unidentified sets of human remains dating back to 1973. In the past five years, forensic genealogy was attempted on six individuals and resulted in two identifications. Unfortunately, their budget cannot manage the cost of using the technology on all of the remains. There is a fiscal note associated with this bill, the office estimates it would cost between \$3,000-5,000 for a kit for testing, but that there may be documents for bulk services -- there may be discounts, excuse me, for bulk services. To get through the backlog of cases could cost about \$100,000 and then after that, it would be 10,00015,000 per year ongoing. I think this is an important expenditure for the state to give families whose children or people have been unidentified. We had several of them come forth and talk with us in committee and it was very touching to know that this would be an important passing of this bill. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Daughtry.

Senator DAUGHTRY: Thank you. Men and women of the Senate, I am proud to rise for my part of the Maine Senate celebration of Women's History Month. Today, I'm proud to rise and honor Maine astronaut Jessica Meir as part of our celebration. Many of you have heard me speak about my love of space, especially while working on the Maine Spaceport Corporation and its projects on Brunswick Landing and that's why I'm so excited today to talk about Jessica Meir. A Caribou native, she was the first Maine woman to travel to space as part of the first three all-female space walks and she spent 205 days there. She's currently training for a future mission to the moon, over half a century after the previous Apollo moon missions of the 1960s and 1970s. For these reasons and many more, it's no surprise that Jessica was named one of Time magazine's 100 Most Influential People of 2020, and was inducted into Maine Women's Hall of Fame in 2022. Growing up in Aroostook County, she often says her favorite place was her family cabin at Big Madawaska Lake. She talks about staring up at the night sky and dreaming of getting to walk in the stars. She began talking about her goal to become an astronaut when she was just in kindergarten, showing the importance of introducing STEM careers and ideas to Mainers of all ages and backgrounds, and I think a good reminder to get outside and look up. After Jessica graduated from high school, she studied biology at Brown University. She went on to earn a Master's degree in Space Studies from the Scripps Institution of Oceanography in San Diego and then she finally earned a Ph.D. studying high-flying bar-headed geese at the University of British Columbia. Fun fact, in one experiment Jessica trained a gaggle of goslings to fly in a wind tunnel while they wore masks and little backpacks with data monitoring equipment. I don't know how many of you have seen the movie Migration, but that's what I imagine when I think of those goslings sporting all of their outfits, flapping their wings into new uncharted lands. She continued to research the physiology of animals in extreme environments and she was an aquanaut, so under the ocean, on an exploration mission in Aquarius, an underground research library - a laboratory. I'm sure there was a library there too. Even with this impressive resume, it's hard to become an astronaut. Jessica tried three times, eventually becoming one of the eight people selected from a pool of 6,000 applicants to participate in the astronaut training program. She's an excellent example of why never to give up on your dreams and try, try again. In 2019, she traveled to the International Space Station, making 3,280 orbits of the Earth and traveling 86.9 million miles and during this time she did work alongside fellow Maine astronaut, Chris Cassidy, on the space station for eight days. In 2020, she was selected for the Artemis Team, a group of eight astronauts focused on training efforts for missions to the moon. Can you imagine: we going to put a Mainer on the moon. I also just want to say that I'm particularly grateful to be standing here today and talking about amazing Maine women as my niece, Adalise, and Jamie are here today and I know that Adalise is already thinking about what she might want to become someday. Maybe a nurse like her mother, a State Senator like me, or whatever she dreams of. One day she could walk on my footsteps in this Chamber or maybe Jessica's or on the surface of the moon. The women we're featuring this month, I think, show that Maine women can do anything they put their mind to. Jessica, you made the entire

state of Maine so proud. We are a small state full of close-knit communities, so we all like to celebrate the Mainers who accomplish big things, and when Jessica blasts into space, hopefully to the moon, she carries the entire state with her. We have a bold, adventurous spirit in Maine and she captures this great tradition moving forward. Thank you.
